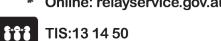

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COUNCIL OBLIGATIONS AND AGENDA REPORTS

Council has several obligations in relation to its Community Vision, Council Plan, Instruments of Legislation and Council policy. These are summarily considered in each Agenda report and further details are added as required. The obligations are as follows:

Community Vision 2040 (Community Vision | Greater Dandenong Council)

After consultation with the Greater Dandenong community on what kind of future they wanted for themselves and our city, the Greater Dandenong People's Panel developed a new Community Vision for 2040:

The City of Greater Dandenong is a home to all.

It's a city where you can enjoy and embrace life through celebration and equal opportunity.

We harmonise the community by valuing multiculturalism and the individual.

Our community is healthy, vibrant, innovative and creative.

Our growing city is committed to environmental sustainability.

Welcome to our exciting and peaceful community.

Reports in this Agenda will identify when any of the above principles are relevant.

The Council Plan 2025-29 (Council Plan 2025-29 | Greater Dandenong Council)

The Council Plan describes the kind of future the Council is working for, and how Council will do this over four years. The Council Plan has the following key strategic objectives:

- A socially connected, safe and healthy city
- A city that respects and celebrates diversity, our history and the arts
- A city of accessible, vibrant centres and places
- A green city committed to a sustainable future
- A city that supports business, entrepreneurship, quality education and employment outcomes
- A Council that demonstrates leadership, responsible use of public resources, and a commitment to investing in the community.

Reports in this Agenda will identify when any of the above principles are relevant.

The Overarching Governance Principles of the Local Government Act 2020

Section 9 of the *Local Government Act* 2020 states that a Council must in the performance of its role give effect to the overarching governance principles. These are:

- a) Council decisions are to be made and actions taken in accordance with the relevant law;
- b) priority is to be given to achieving the best outcomes for the municipal community, including future generations;
- c) the economic, social and environmental sustainability of the municipal district, including mitigation and planning for climate change risks, is to be promoted;
- d) the municipal community is to be engaged in strategic planning and strategic decision making;
- e) innovation and continuous improvement are to be pursued;
- f) collaboration with other Councils and Governments and statutory bodies is to be sought;
- g) the ongoing financial viability of the Council is to be ensured;
- h) regional, state and national plans and policies are to be taken into account in strategic planning and decision making;
- i) the transparency of Council decisions, actions and information is to be ensured.

Also, in giving effect to the overarching governance principles above, a Council must take into account the following supporting principles:

- a) the community engagement principles (section 56);
- b) the public transparency principles (section 58);
- c) the strategic planning principles (section 89);
- d) the financial management principles (section 101);
- e) the service performance principles (section 106).

Reports in this Agenda will identify when any of the above principles are relevant.



The Gender Equality Act 2020

The *Gender Equality Act 2020* came into operation on 31 March 2021 and requires councils to take positive action towards achieving workplace gender equality and to promote gender equality in their policies, programs and services. The objects of the Act are as follows:

- a) to promote, encourage and facilitate the achievement of gender equality and improvement in the status of women; and
- b) to support the identification and elimination of systemic causes of gender inequality in policy, programs and delivery of services in workplaces and communities; and
- c) to recognise that gender inequality may be compounded by other forms of disadvantage or discrimination that a person may experience on the basis of Aboriginality, age, disability, ethnicity, gender identity, race, religion, sexual orientation and other attributes; and
- d) to redress disadvantage, address stigma, stereotyping, prejudice and violence, and accommodate persons of different genders by way of structural change; and
- e) to enhance economic and social participation by persons of different genders; and
- f) to further promote the right to equality set out in the Victorian Charter of Human Rights and Responsibilities and the Convention on the Elimination of All Forms of Discrimination against Women.

Council is obligated to think about how its programs and services affect different people and different communities and how we can avoid reinforcing unintentional inequalities. Reports authors must consider the requirements of the *Gender Equality Act* 2020 and Council's Diversity, Access and Equity Policy when asking Council to consider or review any issues which have a direct or significant impact on members of the Greater Dandenong community.

Victorian Charter of Human Rights and Responsibilities

Council, Councillors and members of Council staff are a public authority under the *Charter of Human Rights* and *Responsibilities Act* 2006 and, as such, are all responsible to act in accordance with the *Victorian Charter of Human Rights and Responsibilities* 2006 (the Charter). The Charter is founded on the following principles:

- human rights are essential in a democratic and inclusive society that respects the rule of law, human dignity, equality and freedom;
- human rights belong to all people without discrimination, and the diversity of the people of Victoria enhances our community;
- human rights come with responsibilities and must be exercised in a way that respects the human rights of others;
- human rights have a special importance for the Aboriginal people of Victoria, as descendants of Australia's first people, with their diverse spiritual, social, cultural and economic relationship with their traditional lands and waters.

Given this municipality's diversity and inclusiveness, when developing or preparing a report for Council consideration, report authors are required to ensure their report is consistent with the standards set by the Charter.



Consideration of Climate Change and Sustainability

One of the overarching governance principles of the *Local Government Act* 2020 is that the economic, social and environmental sustainability of the municipal district, including mitigation and planning for climate change risks, is to be promoted.

In January 2020, this Council joined a growing number of cities around Australia and declared a "Climate and Ecological Emergency" and committed this Council to emergency action on climate change. Council has developed a Climate Change Emergency Strategy and Action Plan 2020-30 to help the City of Greater Dandenong become a resilient, net zero carbon emission city with an active community prepared for the challenges of changing climate.

When developing or preparing a report for Council consideration, report authors are required to consider what impacts their issue has on Council's Declaration on a Climate and Ecological Emergency, Council's Climate Change Emergency Strategy and the requirements of the *Local Government Act* 2020 in relation to the overarching principle on climate change and sustainability.

Related Council Policies, Strategies or Frameworks

Report authors will consider how their report aligns with existing Council policies, strategies, frameworks or other documents, how they may affect the decision of this report or are relevant to this process.

Executive Summary

is an official sanction of that Council. Sealing a document makes it an official document of
Council as a corporate body. Documents that require sealing include agreements, contracts,
leases or any other contractual or legally binding document that binds Council to another party.

3 PUBLIC QUESTION TIME

Question Time at Council meetings provides an opportunity for members of the public in the gallery to address questions to the Councillors, Delegates and/or officers of the Greater Dandenong City Council. Questions must comply with s. 4.5.8 of Council's Governance Rules.

QUESTIONS FROM THE GALLERY

Questions are limited to a maximum of three (3) questions per individual. Where time constraints deem it likely that not all questions can be answered within the time allowed for Question Time, the Mayor at his/her discretion may determine only the first question may be presented verbally with others deferred to be managed in the same manner as public questions not verbally presented.

Priority will be given to questions that relate to items on the Council Agenda for that meeting. Questions including any preamble should not exceed 300 words.

- a) All such questions must be received in writing on the prescribed form or as provided for on Council's website and at Ordinary meetings of Council. Where there are more than three (3) questions received from any one individual person, the Chief Executive Officer will determine the three (3) questions to be considered at the meeting.
- b) All such questions must clearly note a request to verbally present the question and must be received by the Chief Executive Officer or other person authorised for this purpose by the Chief Executive Officer no later than:
 - i) the commencement time (7.00pm) of the Ordinary meeting if questions are submitted in person; or
 - ii) noon on the day of the Ordinary meeting if questions are submitted by electronic medium.
- c) A question can only be presented to the meeting if the Chairperson and/or Chief Executive Officer has determined that the question:
 - i) does not relate to a matter of the type described in section 3(1) of the *Local Government*Act 2020 (confidential information);
 - ii) does not relate to a matter in respect of which Council or a Delegated Committee has no power to act;
 - iii) is not defamatory, indecent, abusive or objectionable in language or substance, and is not asked to embarrass a Councillor, Delegated Member or Council officer; and
 - iv) is not repetitive of a question already asked or answered (whether at the same or an earlier meeting).
- d) If the Chairperson and/or Chief Executive Officer has determined that the question may not be presented to the Council Meeting or Delegated Committee, then the Chairperson and/or Chief Executive Officer:
 - i) must advise the Meeting accordingly; and
 - ii) will make the question available to Councillors or Members upon request.
 - iii) The Chairperson shall call on members of the gallery who have submitted an accepted question to ask their question verbally if they wish.
- e) The Chairperson, Chief Executive Officer or delegate may then direct that question to be answered by a nominated Councillor or member of Council staff.



- f) No debate on, or discussion of, a question or an answer will be permitted other than for the purposes of clarification.
- g) A Councillor, Delegated Committee Member or member of Council staff nominated to answer a question may:
 - i) seek clarification of the question from the person who submitted it;
 - ii) seek the assistance of another person in answering the question; and
 - iii) defer answering the question, so that the answer may be researched and a written response be provided within ten (10) working days following the Meeting (the question thereby being taken on notice).
- h) Question time for verbal presentations is limited in duration to not more than twenty (20) minutes. If it appears likely that this time is to be exceeded then a resolution from Council will be required to extend that time if it is deemed appropriate to complete this item.
- The text of each question asked and the response will be recorded in the minutes of the Meeting.

4.1 POLICY AND STRATEGY

4.1.1 Road Management Plan

Officer Recommendation

That Council ADOPTS the Road Management Plan 2025 as provided in Attachment 1 to this report.

Executive Summary

- 1. As the nominated Road Authority for all local roads within the municipality, Council is required to review its Road Management Plan (the Plan) every four years in order to meet the legislative requirements of the Road Management Act 2004 (the Act).
- Council last adopted the Road Management Plan 2018-22 in June 2021 with the provision of reviewing it by 31 October 2025. This policy has now been reviewed and updated to ensure it is current, compliant and relevant to Council's operational requirements and is presented to Council for adoption.
- 3. The revised Plan was publicly exhibited in August September 2025 and a total of 5 submissions were received. These submissions have been considered and one minor change to the exhibited draft in response to this prior to preparing the final document for adoption.

Background

4. Greater Dandenong City Council, as the Local Road Authority under the Road Management Act 2004 is responsible for the management, maintenance and development of the Local Road network within the municipality. In accordance with the Act, a review of the Road Management Plan (the Plan) has been undertaken by officers in consultation with other related business areas within the organisation. As a result of the review, amendments were made to the Plan to ensure compliance and performance to Council standards.



- 5. The Plan was also reviewed and updated to align with the recommendations provided by MAV Insurance. This advice was provided to all Councils in Victoria to address the liability exposures to the Scheme, and to provide them with the necessary information and tools to ensure their Road Management Plans are not only accepted by a court as being reasonable, but just as importantly, that they are achievable.
- 6. Broadly, the changes between the Road Management Plan 2018-2022 (previous) and proposed Road Management Plan 2025 are:
 - Adopting the recommendations from a review undertaken by the MAV (Municipal Association of Victoria)
 - Updating road classifications/terminologies to a modern standard
 - Some alterations to service standards and timeframes (generally considered an improved level of service)
- In accordance with the relevant legislation, the draft document was exhibited for 28 days with the exhibition advertised in the Age newspaper and submissions sought through Councils website.
- 8. Five (5) submissions were received. Four of these submissions related to peripheral matters to the Road Management Plan (the current condition of roads etc.). One submission related to clarification around drainage pit terminology in response to recent incidents. Minor amendment was made to provide clarification on this matter.

Proposal

- 9. It is proposed that the Road Management Plan 2025 be adopted by Council.
- 10. The required review has been undertaken in accordance with legislation and an updated and improved Road Management Plan proposed.
- 11. The exhibition period for the draft Plan highlighted no significant issues or further amendments required to the Plan and it is considered suitable for adoption.
- 12. A copy of the Road Management Plan for adoption is attached to this report.

13. There are no financial implications associated with this report.

Asset Implications

14. This item provides the mitigation requirements for hazards related to Council assets in the road reserve. The ongoing maintenance costs have been assessed and are included in operating and resource costings.

Legal/Risk Implications

15. Legal advice received from the MAV has been incorporated into the draft Road Management Plan. The Road Management Plan is a key legal document for Council.



Environmental Implications

16. There are no environmental implications relevant to this report.

Community and Stakeholder Consultation

- 17. Prior to this report, the draft Road Management Plan 2025 was available for public consultation in accordance with the requirements of the Local Government Act.
- 18. Consultation occurred from 8 August 2025 to 5 September 2025 via Council's Have Your Say wed page including on 8 August a public notice in The Age daily newspaper and a post on Council's Facebook page.
- 19. The Council Have Your Say web page received 225 views and 5 comments.
- Council officers have reviewed the feedback and made changes to address relevant issues identified.

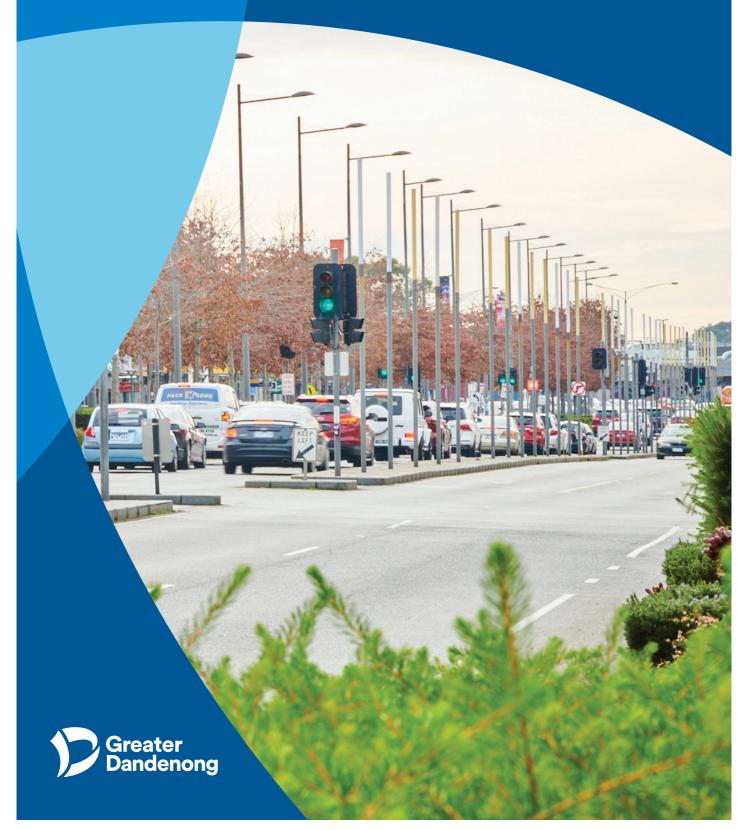

Document Compliance

Council acknowledges the legal responsibility to comply with the *Charter of Human Rights and Responsibilities Act 2006* and the *Equal Opportunity Act 2010*. The *Charter of Human Rights and Responsibilities Act 2006* is designed to protect the fundamental rights and freedoms of citizens. The Charter gives legal protection to 20 fundamental human rights under four key values that include freedom, respect, equality and dignity.

City of Greater Dandenong Road Management Plan

The City of Greater Dandenong ("Council") manages, in accordance with this Road Management Plan (Road Management Plan or "RMP"), the roads (including any ancillary areas) for which it has responsibility pursuant to the Road Management Act 2004 (Road Management Act or RMA).

Council's responsibility under the Act also extends to the management of roads, such as service roads and dedicated parking lanes alongside declared arterial roads, for which the Council is also the responsible road authority.

The City of Greater Dandenong's 'Register of Public Roads' (available at Council's offices during normal working hours and on Councils website) provides additional details of each of the roads for which Council is responsible, however, the Register is not an 'incorporated document' in this Road Management Plan.

This Road Management Plan includes the following:

 The approach implemented by the City of Greater Dandenong in the discharge of its duty to identify, address and mitigate hazards on public roads within the municipality pursuant to the Road Management Act 2004 • Council's Road Hazard Intervention Standards, which are the standards (dealing with intervention levels and response timelines) in accordance with which Council will perform its road management functions related to hazards (Appendix 1 to this Road Management Plan (and being Tables 1, 2 and 3 respectively)).

Introduction

Background

This Road Management Plan is a policy document of the Council which:

- details the approach implemented by the City of Greater Dandenong in the discharge of its duty to identify, address and mitigate hazards on public roads within the municipality pursuant to the Road Management Act 2004
- describes Council's Road Hazard Intervention Standards, which are the standards (dealing with intervention levels and response timelines) in accordance with which Council will perform its road management functions related to hazards.

As the road authority, the Council is entitled to rely on a statutory defence in any proceedings for damages arising from the performance or non-performance of its road management functions concerning a public road. This defence establishes that Council has taken all reasonable care, given the circumstances, to ensure that the relevant section of the public road is not hazardous for traffic.

For the purposes of the defence, Council may rely on a policy which is reasonably based, and which has otherwise been complied with. This Road Management Plan is, and comprises, that policy.

The implementation and management of this Road Management Plan is otherwise, and separately, consistent with Council's various other strategic and corporate plans and policies.

The implementation and oversight of this RMP align with Council's broader strategic and corporate plans and policies. However, this RMP functions as a stand-alone, comprehensive policy document governing the inspection and management of hazards on public roads, paths, and road-related infrastructure within the City of Greater Dandenong. It remains independent of any other Council policy, practice, or procedure related to the performance or

non-performance of road and infrastructure management functions.

If, and to the extent, any other policy, practice or procedure of Council:

- requires (or purports to require) any act, matter or thing to be done by or on behalf of the Council in relation to the performance or non-performance of Council's public road, path and road infrastructure management functions and
- adopts (or purports to adopt) a standard which is or may be in conflict, or inconsistent, with the standards specified in, and by, this Road Management Plan (other standards)

then the standards specified by this Road Management Plan prevail over the other standards to the extent of such conflict or inconsistency, and the other standards are of no force or effect.

This Road Management Plan (RMP) is a policy document that concerns itself with the management of public road hazards relative to the resources available to Council and the safety of public road users. This includes the prioritisation of road infrastructure management based on relevant factors.

The RMP is primarily informed by financial, economic, political, social, and environmental considerations.

The City of Greater Dandenong has a substantial network of variously classified roads and the following infrastructure may be impacted by the requirements of the Act.

Purpose

In accordance with section 50 of the *Road Management Act 2004*, the purpose of this Plan is to:

 establish an approach for the road management functions of the Council related to hazards which is based on policy, operational objectives and available resources and

 specify the relevant standards in relation to the discharge of duties in the performance of those road management functions related to hazards.

This Plan also reflects the 'local government charter' and the purposes and objectives of Council as specified under sections 3A and 3C of the *Local Government Act 1989*. Other legislation which also relates to this Plan includes the *Road Safety Act 1986* and the *Transport Act 1983*.

With respect to the discharge by Council of its duties under the *Road Management Act 2004*, and otherwise in accordance with this Road Management Plan, Council records that it considers, for the purposes of section 39 of the Act, it has adopted and made a reasonable policy decision in relation to the management of public roads in the municipal district (policy decision).

Council considers that the policy decision is otherwise one which accords to the requirements of section 103(b) of the Act, which provides that:

"for the purposes of any proceeding ... an act or omission which is in accordance with a policy determined by the relevant road authority under section 39 does not constitute a wrongful exercise or failure unless the policy is so unreasonable that no road authority in the road authority's position acting reasonably could have made that policy."

Key stakeholders

In preparing this Road Management Plan, Council has considered the interests of key stakeholder groups in the community (as both users of the road network and affected by the network) including:

- the community in general (for recreation, sport, leisure, education and business)
- residents and businesses adjoining the road network
- pedestrians

- users of a range of miscellaneous smaller, lightweight vehicles such as bicycles, motorised buggies, wheelchairs and prams
- vehicle users using motorised vehicles such as trucks, buses, commercial vehicles, cars and motor cycles
- · tourists and visitors to the area
- utilities as described in section 3 of the Road Management Act 2004
- public transport operators
- emergency agencies including the Police, Fire Brigade, Ambulance & the Vic SES
- Council as the responsible road authority
- State and Federal Government that periodically provide support funding to assist with management of the network; and
- · Parks Victoria.

Obligations of road users

Council recognises and considers that all road users have separate obligations with respect to their use of a road which is set out in section 17A of the *Road Safety Act 1986*.

Road Management Plan Review

The period for review of Road Management Plans is set through the Local Government Act 2020. The process for undertaking a review is also governed by this legislation, including the extent of exhibition of the draft document. In light of the review mechanism for Road Management Plans, this Plan has been set out to detail Councils approach and inspection timeframes within the bulk of the document. Any changes to these would be considered significant and trigger comprehensive review of the Plan. Intervention levels and responses are set out within an appendix as they are more likely to be altered during review. Changes to this Appendix is considered less significant in nature and can be reviewed in isolation.

4 Greater Dandenong City Council

Road Management Approach

Application of the Road Management Plan

Councils Road Management Plan deals specifically with addressing hazards on the road network managed by Council.

Council is committed more broadly to responsible and sustainable asset management, including of roads under its management, however, these matters are not the subject of the Road Management Plan and are not a requirement of a Road Management Plan as detailed within the Road Management Act 2004. Some relevant context detailing this is provided within Section 2.2.

The Road Management Plan has been prepared by Council to ensure that in dealing with hazards, Council has a good understanding of both the nature of hazards and risk to the public, as well as the financial, economic, political, social and environmental constraints Council operates within. Review of the above enables Council to generate a Road Management Plan which is both appropriate and realistic to implement.

The Road Management Plan is implemented on and for roads and road infrastructure as detailed in Section 3, through the inspection regime in Section 4 and the Intervention Levels and response times in Appendix 1.

The approach detailed within the core sections of this Plan are anticipated to remain relevant through multiple future iterations of Road Management Plan review. The Intervention Levels and response times in Appendix 1 are likely to be amended with greater frequency (at each review) based on risk assessment and organisational capabilities.

Road Management Context

The Road Management Plan is one of a suite of documents detailing Councils approach to road management. Other documents address the asset management of roads and related infrastructure, as well as public use and access prioritisation. Policies are also incorporated into the system to ensure the roads are managed for optimal benefit of the community.

The City of Greater Dandenong's Service Plans, Asset Management Plans and Asset Operational Plans for Transport Networks and Street Enhancements, respectively, provide for the establishment of service standards and responsibilities, asset lifecycle management of the road network, and include demand and risk analysis for the provision of the road network as well as 10 year plans for the acquisition, renewal, upgrade, expansion, maintenance and disposal programs, and the operation of Council's road and road-related assets.

Regulations and Code of Practice

During the review and preparation of this RMP, Council has taken into consideration the relevant regulations made under the *Road Management Act 2004*, other relevant statutory rules and the guidelines set out in the relevant Codes of Practice, and it will continue to have regard to these regulations, rules and codes (as they may change from time to time) in the performance of Council's road management.

The following Codes of Practice and Regulations that relate to this Road Management Plan are set out below:

- Code of Practice No. S 201 Road Management Plans
- Code of Practice No. S 267 Operational Responsibility for Public Roads

- Code of Practice No. S 269 Management of Infrastructure in Road Reserves
- Code of Practice No. S 351 for Worksite Safety-Traffic Management
- Road Management (General) Regulations 2016
- Road Management (Works and Infrastructure) Regulations 2015
- Road Safety Road Rules 2017, and
- Road Safety (Traffic Management) Regulations 2009.

It is also noted that Section 24(4) of the Road Management Act 2004 also provides that a Code of Practice cannot —

- a) impose a duty on any person or
- b) direct how any matter or thing is to be done or
- c) create an enforceable legal right or
- d) impose any liability or penalty.

Public Roads Register

Council maintains a Register of Public Roads within the municipality which includes:

- the name of each public road
- the date on which the road became a public road
- if a public road ceases to be a public road, the date on which the road ceased to be a public road
- the classification, if any, of the public road
- the reference to any plan or instrument that fixes or varies the boundaries of a public road
- · any ancillary areas and
- a reference to any arrangement under which road management functions are transferred to or from another road authority.

Council's Register of Public Roads is compiled (and roads are registered on the Register) in accordance with the principles outlined in the City of Greater Dandenong's Roads Register Guidelines. These Guidelines assist Council in determining whether a road is 'reasonably required for general public use' within the meaning of section 17(3) of the Road Management Act 2004.

Delegations

Under Council's Instrument of Sub-Delegation by Chief Executive Officer to Members of Council Staff, the Chief Executive Officer has delegated various functions under the Road Management Act 2004 and the relevant Regulations and Codes of Practice made under that Act to respective Council officers. This allows Council, through various responsible members of staff, to respond quickly to technical and administrative matters under the Plan.

Demarcation of Responsibilities

Areas to which the Road Management Plan applies

This Road Management Plan applies to public road, path and road infrastructure over which Council management functions under the *Road Management Act 2004*. This varies across different classifications of road and road related infrastructure.

Municipal roads

Within the City of Greater Dandenong, Council is the coordinating road authority for municipal roads and the Victorian Government is the coordinating road authority for State roads (freeways and declared arterial roads).

A municipal road is any road which is not a State road, including any road which:

- is a road referred to in section 205 of the Local Government Act 1989 or
- is a road declared by VicRoads to be a municipal road under section 14(1)(b) of the Road Management Act 2004 or
- is part of a Crown land reserve under the *Crown Land (Reserves) Act 1978* and Council is the relevant Committee of Management.

For these roads, Council is typically responsible for the following in accordance with the *Road Management Act 2004*.

- road surface, pavement and earth formation
- surface drainage systems including kerb and channel
- footpaths, shared paths, bicycle paths and parking areas and
- · bridges and large culverts
- traffic signals, Council owned streetlights and other road-related infrastructure

State roads

A number of roads within the City of Greater Dandenong are managed by the Victorian Government. There are Declared Arterial Roads and detailed within the Head, Transport for Victoria's Register of Public Roads. Council retains some responsibility for paths, nature strips, outer separators and service roads on Declared Arterial Roads in accordance with the relevant code of practice, and under maintenance agreements.

Freeways located in the City of Greater Dandenong include:

- EastLink (Police Road to Thompsons Road)
- Monash Freeway (Dandenong Creek to Police Road)
- Mornington Peninsula Freeway (Thompson Road to Springvale Road), and
- South Gippsland Freeway (South Gippsland Hwy to Princes Hwy).

Declared Arterial Roads located in the City of Greater Dandenong include:

- · Centre Road
- Chandler Road (Cheltenham Road to Princes Highway)
- · Cheltenham Road
- Dandenong Hastings Road
- Elonera Road (Princes Highway to Meredith Street)
- Jacksons Road
- Foster Street (Cheltenham Road to Stud Road)
- Dandenong By Pass
- Frankston Dandenong Road (Princes Highway to Thompsons Road)
- · Greens Road
- Heatherton Road

- Hutton Road
- · Lonsdale Street
- Police Road (Springvale Road to EastLink)
- Pound Road West
- Princes Highway
- South Gippsland Highway
- · Springvale Road
- Stud Road
- Thompson Road
- Westall Road

New subdivisional roads

Roads created due to subdivision developments or changes in the existing road network are incorporated on a regular basis into Council's Register of Public Roads.

Until a subdivisional road under the *Subdivision Act 1988* is adopted as a public road on Council's Register of Public Roads (on the basis that Council has determined that the road is 'reasonably required for general public use'), Council in the exercise of its discretions over public highways does not assume responsibility for the inspection, maintenance and repair of those roads.

Council's current policy and practice is not to adopt a new subdivisional road as a 'public road' until the date of practical completion of the approved subdivision works. The date of practical completion will be followed with the issue of the statement of compliance and is to be agreed to in writing by Council's delegated officer when the subdivisional works are considered satisfactory, on which date the whole of the works are considered to have entered into the maintenance period. The maintenance period shall be not less than three months.

Boundary roads

The City of Greater Dandenong is bounded by four municipalities; City of Monash, City of Casey, City of Frankston and City of Kingston.

Council's maintenance responsibilities in respect of boundary roads are in accordance with Boundary Agreements which have been developed for affected roads. The following roads are covered by Boundary Agreements:

- Tootal Road
- Police Road
- · Claredale Road

Private roads

There are many roads in the City of Greater Dandenong that are linked to Council's road network but which are not registered as public roads on Council's Roads Register or are otherwise considered to be private roads. Under section 107 of the Road Management Act 2004, Council does not have a statutory duty or a common law duty to perform road management functions in respect of a public highway which is not a public road or in respect of a private road.

Other

Bus bays

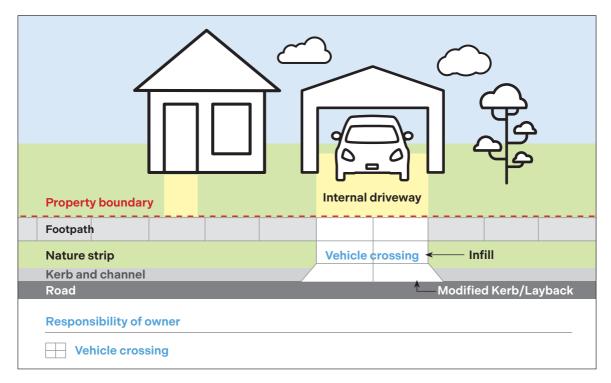
Any paved area (including pavement markings) or unsealed area where buses pull over is maintained by the relevant road authority with operational responsibility for the through carriageway in accordance with the service levels for the abutting roadway.

Rail tracks

Primary control of road-rail crossings rests with the appropriate rail authority. Road / Rail Safety Interface Agreements (RSIA) between Public Transport Safety Victoria and the City of Greater Dandenong have been signed in respect of all road rail crossings within the City. These agreements set out the responsibility of each authority at each crossing.

A list of road rail crossings subject to RSIA's is kept by VicTrack.

Vehicle crossings

Bridges

The City of Greater Dandenong is responsible for the inspection, maintenance and repair of bridges, including pathways on bridges on municipal roads within the City. Bridges interfacing with arterial roads or railways are covered by interface agreements or managed in accordance with the relevant codes of practice.

Utility assets

Non-road infrastructure assets located within a road reserve are not the responsibility of Council but are the responsibility of the person or body (utility provider) that is in charge of the provision, installation, maintenance or operation of the non-road infrastructure asset.

Non-road infrastructure assets within a road reserve include gas pipes, water and sewerage pipes, cables, electricity poles and cables, public telephones and mail boxes.

The majority of water hydrants in road reserves are maintained by South East Water on behalf of Council. Pursuant to section 36 of the *Country Fire Authority Act 1958*, the

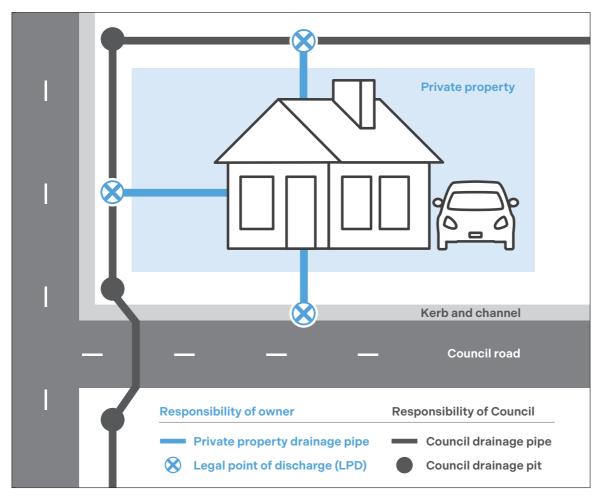
Country Fire Authority may require Council to provide additional water hydrants at any place in or near a public street or road within Council's municipal district.

The Ministerial Code of Practice – 'Management of Infrastructure in Road Reserves' identifies benchmarks of good practice for utility providers and Council who are expected to work together cooperatively to facilitate the installation, maintenance and operation of non-road infrastructure assets within road reserves.

Vehicle crossings

Vehicle crossings are considered private property, and therefore any damage to them is the responsibility of the benefiting property owner. However, Council remains responsible for any section of the crossover that is used by the general public as a footpath or a modified section of kerb and channel that forms part of the drainage network. This section of footpath is subject to the same inspection and maintenance standards applied to the wider public footpath and kerb network.

Legal point of discharge

Vehicle crossings must comply with Council's specifications and standards. These specifications and standards can be accessed either online at greaterdandenong. com or upon request at Council's offices during normal working hours.

Proposed new and altered crossings to properties adjoining arterial roads require a planning permit pursuant to the *Planning and Environment Act 1987* before any works can commence.

Legal point of discharge

The legal point of discharge is the point that stormwater from a property connects to the council drainage network. This could be by connecting into a Council managed drain or the street kerb and channel.

Under the *Water Act 1989* residents and property owners are liable for the flow of water from their land or property.

Property owners are responsible for stormwater drains on their property and any section of their private drain outside the property that connects to the <u>legal point of discharge</u>, including the connection point to the Council's drainage network.

Any stormwater discharged from a property must be via a legal point of discharge determined by Council. Council can be contacted during normal business hours to request a legal point of discharge.

Inspection Standards and Service Level

General

The Council and the community collectively identify road asset defects. This is relied upon to identify hazards and act accordingly, and in the interests of public safety, to minimise any risk of injury to users.

Inspections of road assets are performed in two modes as follows:

- Proactive Inspection, and
- Reactive Inspection

Details on each type of inspection are below.

Considering the financial, economic, political, social, and environmental context, this is considered a realistic and appropriate approach to the identification of hazards and compliant with the requirements of a Road Management Plan.

Proactive Inspections

Proactive inspections are undertaken by trained works officers, who are best placed to identify any hazards and effectively respond. Defects found during these inspections are checked against the set intervention levels for the appropriate asset classification (Appendix 1). Hazards identified which are beyond intervention level will be mitigated or removed using temporary or permanent safety measures or warnings as per the timeframes in Appendix 1.

Roads

Road Classifications are aligned with the Victorian Governments Vicmap Transport Road Classifications, and Councils network inspection frequencies are listed below. Councils Road Register lists all municipal roads and which road classification applies to each. A summary of these classifications is also included with Appendix 2.

Road Classification	Network Inspection Frequency Timeline
Freeway	Not inspected by Council
Highway	Not inspected by Council
Arterial	Not inspected by Council
Sub-Arterial	100% of network every 12 months
Collector Road	100% of network every 12 months
Local Road	100% of network every 12 months
Minor Road	100% of network every 12 months

Paths

Path Classifications are aligned with the Victorian Governments Movement and Place classifications and network inspection frequencies are listed below. A summary of these classifications is also included with Appendix 2.

Path Classification	Network Inspection Frequency Timeline
High frequency paths	100% of network every 12 months
Low frequency paths	100% of network over 4 years
	Approximately 25% of network each year

Bridges

All bridges within the municipality for which Council is responsible, including road bridges and pedestrian bridges are inspected to the same frequency as listed below.

Bridge Classification	Network Inspection Frequency Timeline
All Bridges	Twice yearly with a maximum interval of 6 months
	Inspection shall also be carried out after flooding or bushfire events as soon as reasonably practicable

Reactive Inspections

Reactive Inspections are initiated by the community who notify Council of a concern or hazard.

The available channels for the community to be able to contact Council are reviewed frequently to ensure hazards can be reported effectively. The community can contact Council via e-mail, phone, online or in person at Council's Customer Service Centres. The community are able to advise whether they consider an issue to be a general enquiry, or an emergency situation.

Trained works officers investigate these enquiries to identify any hazards and effectively respond. Hazards found during these inspections are checked against the set intervention levels for the appropriate asset classification (Appendix 1). Hazards identified which are beyond intervention level will be mitigated or removed using temporary or permanent safety measures or warnings as per the timeframes in Appendix 1.

Exceptional Circumstances

Council will make every effort to meet its commitments under the Road Management Plan. However, there may be situations or circumstances that affect Council's business activities to the extent that it cannot deliver on the service levels of the Road Management Plan. These include but are not limited to natural disasters, such as fires, floods, or storm; or, a prolonged labour or resource shortage, due to a need to commit or redeploy Council staff and/or equipment elsewhere.

In the event that the Chief Executive Officer of Council has considered the impact of such an event or circumstance on the limited financial and other resources of Council and Council's other competing priorities and budgetary constraints (whether or not in conjunction with Council), and has determined that any standards of, or requirements in, the Road Management Plan cannot be adequately met, then pursuant to and reliant on the principles set out in Section 83 of the Wrongs Act 1958 and otherwise, they will write to the Council's officer in charge of its Road Management Plan and inform them that some, or all, of the timeframes and response times are to be suspended until further notice. Where assets covered by the Road Management Plan are impacted for an extended period, a modified plan for these assets only may be put in place.

Section 83 of the Wrongs Act 1958 provides:

83 Principles concerning resources, responsibilities etc. of public authorities In determining whether a public authority has a duty of care or has breached a duty of care, a court is to consider the following principles (amongst other relevant things):

- (a) the functions required to be exercised by the authority are limited by the financial and other resources that are reasonably available to the authority for the purpose of exercising those functions
- (b) the functions required to be exercised by the authority are to be determined by reference to the broad range of its activities (and not merely by reference to the matter to which the proceeding relates)
- (c) the authority may rely on evidence of its compliance with the general procedures and applicable standards for the exercise of its functions as evidence of the proper exercise of its functions in the matter to which the proceeding relates.

Once the scope of the event/s have been determined, and the resources committed to the event response have been identified, then there will be an ongoing consultation between Council's CEO and Council's officer responsible for the Road Management Plan, to determine which parts of Council's Road Management Plan are to be reactivated, and when.

Council statements to residents about the suspension or reduction of the services under the Road Management Plan will include reference to how the work that will be done has been prioritised, and the period for which it is likely to be affected.

Definitions

Unless the context or subject matter otherwise requires (including in relation to the Glossary set out in this Road Management Plan), the terms used in this Road Management Plan have the same meaning as the definitions included in the Road Management Act 2004, the relevant Regulations and Codes of Practice made under the Road Management Act 2004, the Local Government Act 2020 or as defined by AustRoads.

Note on defect treatment

Defect treatment is the process of treating the hazard to the extent that it is no longer a hazard beyond the specified intervention levels affecting the public.

This may involve repair or replacement. Examples of this would be replacement of a missing pit lid, or grinding a section of vertically displaced footpath.

Defect treatment work may involve the installation of barricading, or provision of traffic control (including the installation of warning signs and other traffic management devices) to restrict access to a hazard.

Defect treatment times are in working days (i.e. weekdays which do not fall on a public holiday). Working days may be converted to calendar days by adding 2 days to every 5 working days or part thereof.

Glossary of Terms

Unless the context or subject matter requires otherwise, the following terms in this road management plan have the following meanings:

Arterial road

Freeways, highways & declared main roads which are managed by the State Government through VicRoads.

Code of Practice

Codes of practice under the Road Management Act, including the Road Management Plans Code of Practice, a supporting document to the legislation, which provides practical guidance to a road authority in the making of a RMP.

Consent applications

Applications made by other road authorities, private contractor and utilities companies to perform works on Council-managed roads.

Emergency Situations

Where hazard presents an immediate and significant threat to the safety of road and footpath users.

'Exceptional Circumstances' clause

A clause included in the Road Management Plan that describes the conditions under which a Council can suspend its maintenance hazard mitigation and inspection responsibilities under the Road Management Plan due to the occurrence of events outside their control. The 'Exceptional Circumstances' clause also details the process for reinstating the Road Management Plan.

Hazard description

Refers to a change to the road or footpath surface that introduces a hazard to public safety. Common terminology includes: pothole, lift, shove, lip, crazing, depression, etc.

Infrastructure and works managers

Staff of road authorities that are responsible for the management and maintenance and hazard response of roads as determined by the classification system within the Road Management Act 2004 and as contained in the Roads Register.

Intervention level

The size of a defect at which the road authority has determined that the defect will be constitute a hazard.

Level of Service

Describes the outputs or objectives an organisation or activity intends to deliver to its customers.

Municipal roads

Roads for which Council is the responsible road authority.

Non-road infrastructure

Includes infrastructure in, on, under, or over a road, which is not road infrastructure. The Road Management Act provides examples of non-road infrastructure that includes: gas pipes, water and sewerage pipes, cables, electricity poles, bus shelters, rail infrastructure, public telephones, mail boxes, road side furniture and fences erected by utilities or providers of public transport.

Other roads

Include roads in State reserves, and roads on private property. Council is not responsible for the care and maintenance of these roads.

Path or pathway

The definition of pathway provided in the Road Management Act captures both 'footpaths' and 'shared pathways' as outlined below:

It includes a footpath, bicycle path or other area constructed or developed by a responsible road authority for use by members of the public other than with a motor vehicle but does not include any path:

- (a) which has not been constructed by a responsible road authority; or
- (b) which connects to other land.

Proactive inspections

Inspections performed as part of a scheduled program, according to the classification of roads, which is based on the road classification for the purpose of identifying defects above intervention and to provide a record that the road has been inspected.

Public Road Register

List of roads within a municipality that a council is responsible for. Council is required to keep a register under S.19 of the Road Management Act.

Reactive inspections

Inspections performed in response to a customer request or notification about the condition of the road, in order to assess whether the road contains a hazard that has reached the relevant intervention level.

Responsible Road Authority

The organisation responsible for the management of the road, as determined under S.37 of the Road Management Act.

Road

Includes a street; right of way; cul de sac; by-pass; bridge or ford; footpath; bicycle path or other land or works forming part of the road.

Road infrastructure

The infrastructure which forms part of a roadway, pathway or shoulder, including:

- Structures forming part of the roadway, pathway or shoulder; and the roadrelated infrastructure;
- Materials from which a roadway, pathway or shoulder is made; such as asphalt, bitumen, gravel, lane markers and lines.

Road Management Act

Road Management Act 2004 (Vic) The Act provides a statutory framework

for the management of the road network in Victoria.

Road Management Plan

A policy document developed by a Council to assist in the management of its road-related duties and responsibilities, as defined in the RMA.

Road Reserve

All of the area of land that is within the boundaries of a road.

Roadside

Any land that is within the boundaries of a road (other than the shoulders of the road) which is not a roadway or a pathway and includes the land on which any vehicle crossing or pathway which connects from a roadway or pathway on a road to other land has been constructed.

Safety Signs

Regulatory signs (excluding parking signs which do not contain red), warning signs and hazards signs.

Structures

Bridges, culverts or other designated structures (eg retaining walls, lighting structures) which have been assigned an asset number in Council's Asset Register

- 1. APPROVES the Annual Report 2024-25 (per Attachment 1) and presents the same to the public as a report on the implementation of the final year of the Council Plan 2021-25, in line with the legislative requirements of the *Local Government Act 2020*; and
- 2. AUTHORISES the Chief Executive Officer, or their delegate, to make amendments to the document to correct any minor drafting errors that do not materially alter the intent of the document.

Executive Summary

1. The Annual Report 2024-25 has been prepared in accordance with the *Local Government Act* 2020 and contains all mandatory information as outlined in the legislation.

Background

- 2. Council has a statutory obligation to prepare an Annual Report that is in accordance with sections 98 and 99 of the *Local Government Act 2020*. The Annual Report must be prepared as soon as is practicable after the end of the financial year and Council is required to publicly consider the report within four months of the end of the financial year.
- 3. The Annual Report must contain:
 - a. a report of operations of the Council;
 - b. audited financial statements;
 - c. an audited performance statement; and
 - d. a copy of the Auditor's report on the financial statements under Part 3 of the Audit Act.

Key Issues and Discussion

- 4. The audited statements were approved in-principle by Council at the 22 September 2025 Ordinary Council Meeting. Subsequent to this, the Auditor-General's endorsement of the statements has been received with no further amendment.
- 5. The Greater Dandenong City Council Annual Report 2024-25 meets all legislative requirements.
- 6. The presentation of the completed Annual Report 2024-25 to this meeting is a condition of section 100 of the *Local Government Act 2020* which requires Council to consider the annual report at a meeting of the council within four months of the end of the financial year.
- Copies of the adopted Annual Report will be made available at Council's customer service centres and libraries, and on Council's website at www.greaterdandenong.vic.gov.au on 14 October 2025.



- 8. The Greater Dandenong City Council Annual Report 2024-25 also incorporates performance highlights against each of the strategic objectives, which outline Council's major achievements for the financial year ending 30 June 2025.
- 9. Key highlights in 2024-25 included:
 - a. \$60 million invested in infrastructure including community facilities, recreation spaces, roads and footpaths
 - b. 99% completion of the Keysborough Community Hub which will open to the public in September
 - c. Commencement of construction on the new Dandenong Wellbeing Centre our largest infrastructure project to date
 - d. \$1.7 million of State Government funding announced for 2025-26 to undertake path works following the completion of the Progress Street Level Crossing Removal
 - e. Over 69,000 people engaged through festivals and events across the municipality
 - f. Over 820,000 visitors welcomed to Council's libraries
 - g. 82% reduction in Council emissions.
- 10. Printed copies of the report are available to interested members of the public upon request.

Operating Budget Implications

- 12. The Financial Statements of Greater Dandenong City Council, as included in the attached Annual Report, are a general purpose financial report that consists of a Comprehensive Income Statement, Balance Sheet, Statement of Changes in Equity, Statement of Cash Flows, Statement of Capital Works and notes accompanying these financial statements. This report complies with Australian Accounting Standards (AAS), other authoritative pronouncements of the Australian Accounting Standards Board, the *Local Government Act 2020* and the Local Government (Planning and Reporting) Regulations 2020.
- 13. These consolidated financial statements for the year ended 30 June 2025 comprise the results of operations for both Council and its wholly owned subsidiaries, namely the Dandenong Market Pty Ltd and South East Leisure Pty Ltd.
- 14. The Comprehensive Income Statement highlights that Greater Dandenong City Council's accounting surplus for the financial year is \$30.91 million (\$12.29 million in 2023-24). The early distribution practices of Financial Assistance grant allocation funding by the Victorian Local Government Grants Commission contributed to the surplus increase from the prior year.
- 15. In order to reach the overall comprehensive income result, Council has recorded a revaluation increase of its roads, drainage, footpaths and off-street carparks of \$373 million resulting in a Comprehensive Income Statement surplus result of \$404 million. It is emphasised that these are accounting results only and comprise significant non-cash items.

Asset Implications

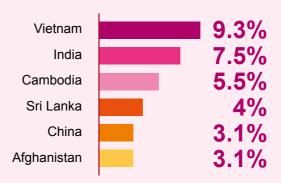

Community Vision

In 2021 the City of Greater Dandenong created a new community vision which expressed their aspirations and hopes for the future of the municipality. This vision was developed through extensive broad consultation including workshops, surveys, pop up installations and online activities.

As required by the Local Government Act 2020, a deliberative engagement process was then undertaken, and the Greater Dandenong People's Panel was formed. This panel of 31 residents and business owners, representative of the community's diversity, were asked to consider the outcomes of the broad community consultation phase and background information provided by Council, to develop a new vision and principles. They spent three and a half days deliberating and reviewed all of the community engagement outcomes, heard from guest speakers from local businesses and community groups, and discussed current and future challenges for our city.

The final vision created by the panel reflects the aspirations of the community and the principles outline what Council should focus on to help achieve this.

Our community's vision for 2040 is:

The City of Greater Dandenong is a home to all. It's a city where you can enjoy and embrace life through celebration and equal opportunity.

We harmonise the community by valuing multiculturalism and the individual. Our community is healthy, vibrant, innovative and creative.

Our growing city is committed to environmental sustainability. Welcome to our exciting and peaceful community.

To complement the vision and further define what the community would like to see Greater Dandenong be in 2040, six principles were developed. These principles are:

- 1. Safe and peaceful community
- 2. Education, training, entrepreneurship and employment opportunities
- 3. Sustainable environment
- 4. Embrace diversity and multiculturalism
- 5. Mind, body and spirit
- 6. Art and culture

This vision and its accompanying principles influence Council's key strategic direction and the priorities that are set for each financial year. The results of this project informed the planning stages of the Council Plan 2021–25, Annual Plan and other key strategic documents across Council.

In 2024 the vision was reviewed by the Community Panel formed to develop the new Council Plan 2025–29. The community feedback received during the extensive Council Plan consultation activities reflected the intent of the vision and its principles as created in 2021 and the panel agreed this was still reflective of the hopes and aspirations of our community.



Strategic Objectives

Council's strategic objectives form the Council Plan 2021–25 and reflect the hopes and aspirations of the community as expressed in the community vision and accompanying principles:

- · A socially connected, safe and healthy city
- · A city that respects and celebrates diversity, our history and the arts
- · A city of accessible, vibrant centres and neighbourhoods
- · A green city committed to a sustainable future
- A city that supports entrepreneurship, quality education and employment outcomes
- · A Council that demonstrates leadership and a commitment to investing in the community.



Year in Review

Message from our Mayor and CEO

2024–25 has been a year of meaningful progress and proud achievements for Greater Dandenong City Council. Together, we've advanced key projects, strengthened our commitment to delivering high-quality services, and laid a strong foundation for the future of our city.

Our newly elected Council, with eight returning Councillors and three new representatives, endorsed a new Council Plan, setting our priorities and directions for this Council term. The new plan is the result of thousands of pieces of community feedback and has a strong focus on community outcomes and impacts. Together we will continue to build on the accomplishments of this year.

We achieved a surplus operating result of \$30.9 million, reflecting responsible financial management and a commitment to delivering value for our community. We invested \$60 million in infrastructure, including new community facilities, recreation spaces, roads and footpaths.

Big achievements in 2024–25 included:

- Over 69,000 people engaged through festivals and events, more than 820,000 visitors welcomed to our libraries, and an impressive 82% reduction in Council emissions.
- Starting construction of the new Dandenong Wellbeing Centre – our largest infrastructure project to date. Replacing Dandenong Oasis, this once-in-a-generation investment will be a cornerstone of community health and wellbeing.
- 99% completion of the Keysborough Community Hub which will be open to the public in September.
- 75 transport infrastructure projects were delivered and/or advocated for.
- \$1.7 million in State Government funding announced for path works following the completion of the Progress Street Level Crossing Removal. This funding will be received in 2025-26.





A major source of pride has been our community satisfaction score, which rose to 7.5 out of 10. This was the highest result across metropolitan Melbourne in 2025, and the equal-highest result ever recorded by our survey company.

Satisfaction with most areas of Council performance was notably higher than the metropolitan average, including overall satisfaction with the customer service experience (6% higher in Greater Dandenong), planning and development (5% higher), overall performance (4% higher), governance and leadership (4% higher), and services and facilities (3% higher).

These results reflect a very strong level of community satisfaction with the performance of the Greater Dandenong City Council. In addition to assessing our performance across a range of areas, this survey provides insights into ways to improve service delivery.

This year we also saw significant funding commitments from the Federal Government on a range of projects, including:

- \$1.6m for CCTV upgrades in Noble Park and Dandenong
- \$1.5m Federal Government announcement for the establishment of a Dandenong Employment Hub
- \$1.44m on upgrades to parks and sporting facilities
- \$900,000 Federal Government announcement for Ross Reserve upgrades including femaleinclusive change rooms and amenities
- \$400,000 Federal Government announcement for sports field lighting at Fotheringham Reserve.

These funding commitments are a result of strong and strategic advocacy work and we look forward to seeing these projects come to fruition.

Our city was honoured with a number of awards this year, including:

- The HOME24 exhibition, celebrating themes of migration, belonging, and creativity, won the 2024 Victorian Multicultural Award for Excellence in the Arts and was shortlisted for the Public Galleries Association of Victoria Awards.
- Springvale Snow Fest received an Honourable Mention in the 2025 National Local Government Awards, continuing to attract tens of thousands of visitors annually.
- The EventConnect Project, which streamlined event application processes, won the LGPRO 2025 Customer Experience Award.
- South East Leisure, our leisure facility operator, earned three major accolades at the 2025 Aquatic and Recreation Victoria Awards.

These achievements reflect the hard work and dedication of our Councillors and staff, who continue to work tirelessly for our community.

Our achievements this year show what's possible when we work together with purpose and passion. Together, we are making Greater Dandenong a place we're proud to call home.

Why I wanted to be Junior Mayor

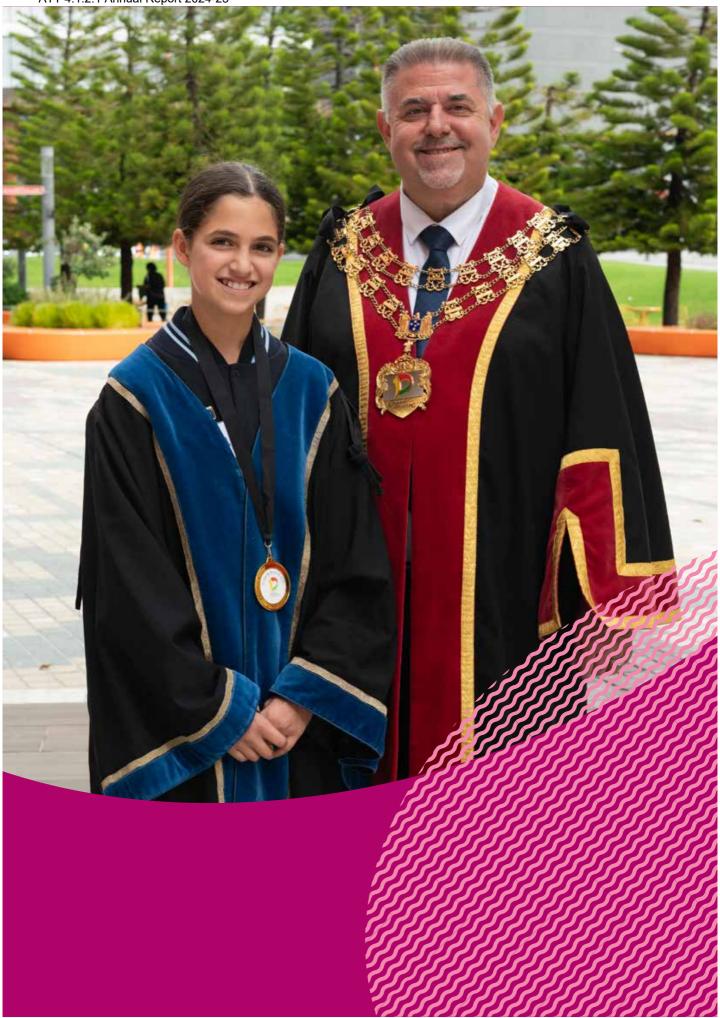

The Council

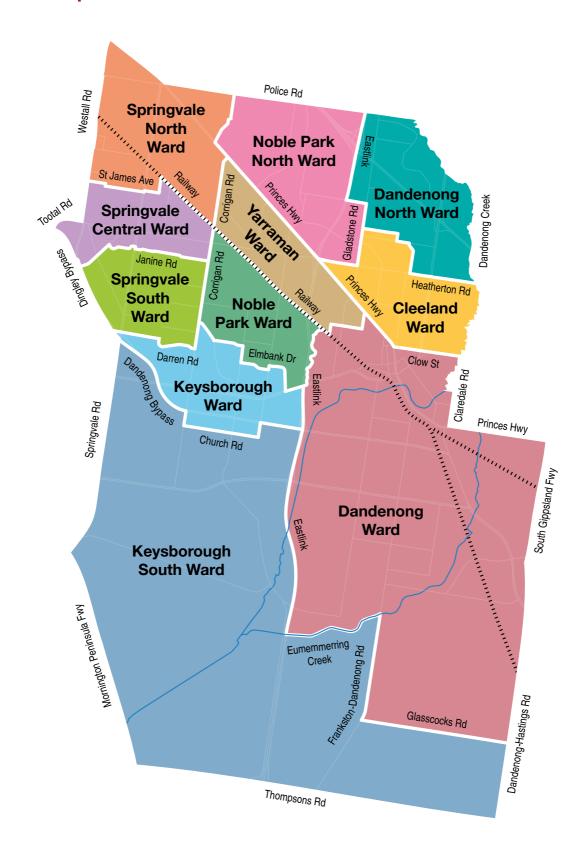

Under the *Local Government Act 2020*, Council's key roles include, but are not limited to:

- acting as a representative government for the diverse communities across the City of Greater Dandenong when making decisions and taking actions in accordance with the relevant law
- promoting the economic, social and environmental sustainability of the municipality, including mitigation and planning for climate change risks
- engaging with the community in strategic planning and strategic decision making, and monitoring its achievements

- pursuing innovation and continuous improvement and collaborating with other councils, Governments and statutory bodies
- maintaining the ongoing financial viability of Council by ensuring that resources are managed in a responsible, transparent and accountable manner
- advocating for the interests of the local community to other communities and governments
- fostering community cohesion and encouraging active participation in civic life
- making all decisions impartially and transparently, and in the best interests of the whole community.

Greater Dandenong City Council was elected on 25 October 2024. The next Council elections are scheduled for 26 October 2028.

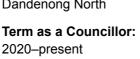

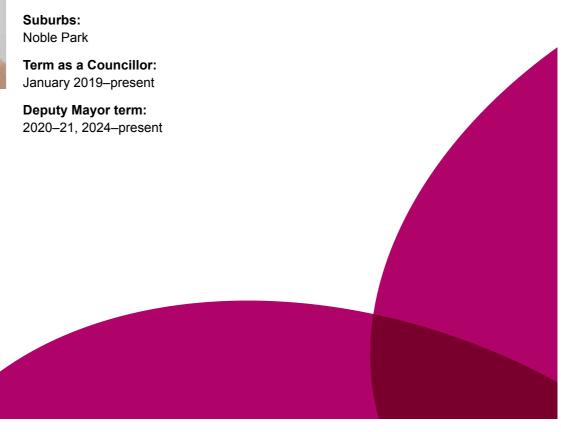

Governance

Greater Dandenong City Council is committed to good corporate governance. The development of policies, codes of practice and systems, together with adherence to legislative requirements and transparent reporting, are all part of Greater Dandenong's commitment to open and accountable government.

The Chief Executive Officer (CEO) is appointed by Council for the purpose of managing the operations of the organisation. The CEO then delegates operational functions and duties to Council officers that will be undertaken in an accountable, efficient and effective manner.

Council's Legislative Compliance Policy provides a uniform framework approach to ensure compliance with all laws, regulations, industry and internal codes of conduct relevant to Council and which impact the day to day activities of Council.

Model Code of Conduct - Councillors

Greater Dandenong City Council's Model Councillor Code of Conduct sets out guidelines within which elected representatives must operate. It outlines behaviours and actions which reduce the risk of corruption or misuse of Council assets, including information.

The Model Councillor Code of Conduct is a key component of Greater Dandenong's commitment to open and accountable government and is available online at www.greaterdandenong.vic.gov.au/councillor-code-conduct

Council meetings

Council conducts its business in open and publicly advertised meetings.

Council meetings are generally held on the second and fourth Monday of each month and commence at 7.00pm. All Council meetings are held in the Council Chamber at 225 Lonsdale Street, Dandenong unless otherwise notified.

Council meetings are held to consider items such as planning permit applications, capital improvement works and programs, community service matters, road and traffic management, local laws, administration and financial issues and to annually elect the Mayor and Deputy Mayor.

All Council meetings are conducted in accordance with Council's Governance Rules.

During 2024–25, there were 21 Council meetings. This is inclusive of the Council meeting held on 18 November 2024 to elect a Mayor and Deputy Mayor.

During 2024–25, the average number of 'logins' to the live webcasts per ordinary Council meeting was 37 with 136 'logins' recorded as an average against each archived (non-live) webcast of each Council meeting.

The Local Government Act 2020, and subsequently Council's Governance Rules, provide for virtual (remote) meetings to be held.

Notices of Motion

A notice of motion is a proposal for action by a Councillor submitted to a Council meeting. In the 2024–25 financial year 12 notices of motion were submitted by Councillors.

Mayor, Deputy Mayor and Councillor allowances

Under the Local Government Act 2020 and the Victorian Independent Remuneration Tribunal and Improving Parliamentary Standards Act 2019, the Victorian Independent Remuneration Tribunal (VIRT) sets allowances payable to Mayors, Deputy Mayors and Councillors. At the beginning of July 2024, the Victorian Independent Remuneration Tribunal made a determination providing for an annual adjustment to the values of the allowances payable to Mayors, Deputy Mayors, and Councillors. The Tribunal has determined to increase the value of base allowances by 3.5 per cent with effect from 1 July 2024.

A 3.5 per cent increase was also applied to the base allowance values for Mayors and Deputy Mayors from 18 December 2024.

The Councillor Expenses, Support and Accountability Policy allows for the administrative support needed by Councillors to perform their role and for the fair reimbursement of the costs associated with their role. The policy also provides for Mayoral and Councillors' attendances at Council meetings and Councillor Briefing Sessions to be published online together with a record of Councillor expenses.

Councillor Expenses

In accordance with Section 40 of the *Local Government Act 2020*, Council is required to reimburse a Councillor for expenses incurred whilst performing their duties as a Councillor. These expenses can be found on Council's website and are updated monthly. The expenses include information technology and communication, conferences and training, travel expenses, vehicle mileage and any other bona fide expenses claimed. Under section 53 of the *Local Government Act* 2020, Council has established an Audit and Risk Committee. This committee operates as an independent advisory committee to Council with the primary objective of assisting Council in the effective and efficient management of its responsibilities for financial reporting, risk and Council's internal and external audit functions.

As part of Council's governance obligations to its community, Council constituted an Audit and Risk Committee Charter which guides Council and the Audit and Risk Committee to:

- monitor the compliance of Council policies and procedures with the overarching governance principles of the Local Government Act 2020 and associated regulations and Ministerial directions
- effectively monitor Council's financial and performance reporting
- monitor and provide advice on risk management and fraud prevention systems and controls
- oversee an effective and thorough internal and external audit function
- · adopt an annual work program
- undertake an annual assessment of its performance against the Charter
- prepare a biannual audit and risk report as prescribed in the Local Government Act 2020

Local Government Act 2020

Council implemented all obligations under the *Local Government Act 2020* that were required prior to 30 June 2025.

Domestic Animals Act 1994

In accordance with the *Domestic Animals Act* 1994, Council is required to prepare a Domestic Animal Management Plan (DAMP) at four yearly intervals and evaluate its implementation in the annual report.

Council adopted its Domestic Animal Management Plan 2021–25 in June 2022.

Food Act 1984

In accordance with section 7E of the *Food Act* 1984, Council is required to publish a summary of any Ministerial Directions received during the financial year in its annual report. No such Ministerial Directions were received by Council.

Road Management Act 2004

In accordance with section 22 of the *Road Management Act 2004*, a Council must publish a copy or summary of any Ministerial Directions in its annual report. No such Ministerial Directions were received by Council during the financial year.

Risk Management

Council's strategic risks were updated in consultation with the Executive Team and Councillors. These align with the strategic objectives and priorities of the Council Plan. Annual Plan items are also cross-referenced to identify risks, and these examples of integration are being applied under various other strategies and plans to identify where operational and longer-term actions address risks.

Insurance renewals for 2024–25 provided favourable terms, in a challenging market, driven by significant international events and a difficult economic environment.

Several system improvements were explored in early 2025, to provide improved monitoring, data and reporting, with dashboard capability for the Executive Team's oversight of risk control actions.

Contracts

All contracts valued at \$300,000 or more were entered into as a result of a competitive process or through the use of a pre-established Local Government or State Government panel arrangement or State Government pre-qualified authorised register.

Council issued 32 tenders in 2024–25 covering various service categories including:

- · event infrastructure and equipment hire,
- · marketing,
- · community services,
- · consultancy and professional services,
- · building trade, repairs and maintenance,
- · construction and operations, and
- technology.

Council did not enter into any other contract valued at \$300,000 or more for goods or services without engaging in a competitive process as per Council's Procurement Policy.

Council operates a centre-led model for managing procurement and suppliers, aiming to ensure value for money, sustainability and local business growth. During 2024–25, Council has become a

leader in procurement practice and continues to strengthen its procurement activities including its Procurement Framework and Training, Value for Money principles and further digital upgrades under the following programs:

- expansion of procurement resources, capability and training
- added functionality and capacity for local and social enterprises
- streamlined policy across the network for value for money
- further procurement training and collaboration with councils.

Municipal Emergency Management

2024–25 was another busy year for our Emergency Management team. Council received a record number of requests to coordinate emergency relief and recovery support for local businesses and residents.

As a result, Council has invested in training and qualifying a larger number of existing staff to perform emergency management roles. These new deputy Municipal Emergency Management Officers (MEMOs) and deputy Municipal Recovery Managers (MRMs) have increased the capacity of Council to provide 24-hour response coverage in accordance with our legislated obligations.

In addition, several staff were trained as Municipal Fire Prevention Officers (MFPO). They supported the work of our local laws team during a longer fire season that ran from 9 December 2024 to 1 May 2025.

Working with our agency partners, the Municipal Emergency Management Planning Committee (MEMPC) has focused on updating the Greater Dandenong Municipal Storm and Flood Sub Plan and continued to mitigate the risks of high-risk waste sites across the region.

Due to several incidents this year, the MEMPC has also established another working group to investigate and support the emergency preparedness of Supported Residential Services (SRSs) and Caravan Parks.

Organisational structure



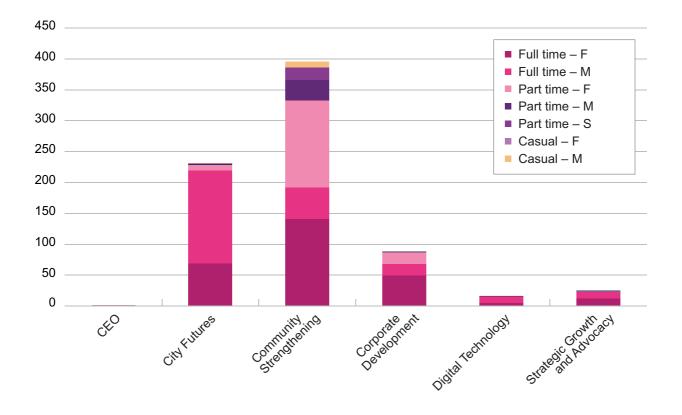

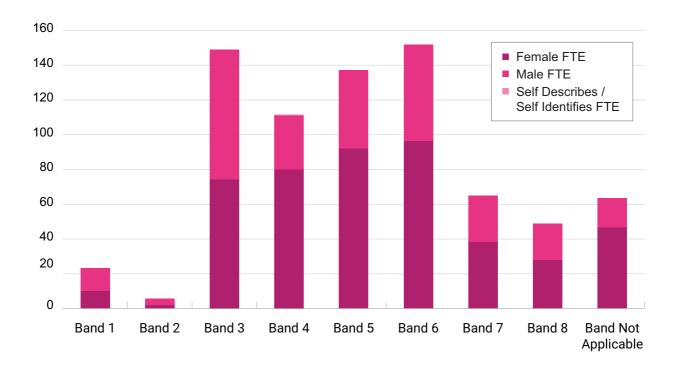

Employee Satisfaction

Council has continued to utilise a staff pulse survey and this year achieved the highest participation rate ever achieved with this survey. The survey supports the organisation to understand the employee experience, with varying trends across different demographics and departments with action plans supported across each department.

The strong themes across the organisation reflect our strengths as well as areas of ongoing focus. In 2025 these were:

- Workplace culture and work that makes a difference. In particular the opportunity to work with a talented team and supportive leader; delivering for the community.
- Workload, resourcing, role clarity and prioritisation. Managing the balance between planned and unplanned work and an ongoing focus on clarity of priorities.
- The value of leaders who listen and ask questions of all levels of staff.
- Ongoing focus on a holistic approach to safety and wellbeing.
- The value of change processes, and engaging staff and stakeholders in coming up with solutions and understanding issues.
- Council continues to have comparatively low turnover, with an overall turnover rate for the financial year of 12.25 per cent. The last reported average staff turnover in similar Councils was approximately 17.16 per cent in 2021–22.

Innovation

Over the recent months innovation has been a focus across a number of business units in Council with a focus on trust and decision approvals, collaboration and recruitment and selection activities. A major focus of the work performed by the People and Change team has been to improve internal recruitment processes and support for staff.

Our unique core capability framework has been integrated into human resource activities, including personal development planning and the recruitment and selection process. Internal business process management software has been implemented which will enable further efficiencies and improvements to the recruitment and selection process.

Gender Equality

Under the *Gender Equality Act 2020* (GE Act) Council is required to report on progress against its Gender Equality Action Plan (GEAP) to the Commission for Gender Equality in the Public Sector (CGEPS).

A key focus over the 2024–25 financial year has been progressing actions for the 2021–25 GEAP. Council continues to make progress towards improving gender equality within the workplace to ensure an equitable and safe workplace is achieved for all.

Leadership capability

This year, Council enhanced its leadership capability programs designed to strengthen culture, enhance communication, foster collaboration and drive engagement with strategic priorities. Programs were offered at all levels of leadership including a monthly leadership network for senior leaders and quarterly people leaders' forums.

As a focus on continuous improvement, a number of CEO briefings have been implemented to engage with employees and to assist with the communication of organisational priorities and service delivery.

Workplace Health and Safety

Council prioritises a safe working environment, fostering a shared culture of collective responsibility for workplace health and safety. This requires active engagement and cooperation from all employees. Through proactive and practical measures, we aim to eliminate or reduce risks that could cause harm to employees, volunteers, contractors, visitors, and anyone affected by our operations.

In May 2025, Council successfully recruited a Manager, Occupational Health and Safety, reflecting its dedication to workplace health and safety. The appointment signifies a proactive approach in strengthening and enhancing Council's safety systems and performance. The key focus will be to drive strategic initiatives to promote a strong safety culture, robust safety framework and compliance with laws and regulations.

Council continued the utilisation of Preventure to assess the risk of musculoskeletal injuries which are common in workplaces that involve hazardous manual handling. Preventure is a wearable device designed to monitor and display muscle load in real time as individuals perform tasks. Through data analysis, Council has made data driven decisions to improve workplace safety and mitigate the risk of musculoskeletal injuries.

Additionally, Council's ongoing implementation of SafeZone, a personal duress system, highlights its commitment to enhancing employee safety in an emergency response. This technology empowers employees to swiftly alert others in emergency situations, facilitating a prompt and effective response.

As of June 30, Council reported a rate of 7.8 WorkCover lost-time injuries per 1,000,000 hours worked. Council's WorkCover lost time performance is predicted to be lower compared to similar industries which averaged 10.5 in 2023 as per Safe Work Australia industry comparison data.

Family Violence Prevention Initiatives

Council continues its commitment to the prevention of family violence both within the community and for any staff who may be experiencing this themselves. Council maintains a network of staff who are able to provide support and resources including referral to appropriate services in the role of Family Violence Contact Officers.

In November 2024, the annual Council sponsored Walk for Family Violence was successfully conducted and the event saw significant attendees from across the community and local service providers. This event continues to demonstrate Council's commitment to raising awareness and building capacity within the community to help reduce the incidence of this issue.

Child Safety and Wellbeing

Victoria's Child Safe Standards effective from July 2022 aim to enhance the safety and protection of children and young people.

Council has reviewed the Child Safety and Wellbeing Policy and has commenced the delivery of organisation-wide child safety training. A Child Safety Officer was appointed to support the future focus and to continue to build on Council's child safety practices.

Asset Management

The City of Greater Dandenong recognises the importance of, and is committed to, improving asset management in accordance with the National Asset Management Assessment Framework (NAMAF). This includes updating information, expanding knowledge and applying the latest tried and tested technology. Asset Management is the combination of management, financial, economic and engineering philosophy and other practices applied to physical assets.

The objective is to support Council's services to provide the required level of service to the community by ensuring the assets are in place in the most cost-effective manner for service delivery. The notion of cost effectiveness is one that is applied to the minimum whole of lifecycle cost.

Council has an Asset Management and Service Delivery unit and a Services and Assets Management Steering Committee. The steering committee oversees the development of asset management policy and strategy, implementation, monitoring and the continuous improvement of asset management projects.

These are supported by an asset management system and processes. Council uses the NAMAF to conduct moderated self-assessments and identify improvements. A Road Management Plan (RMP) has been adopted by Council in accordance with the *Road Management Act 2004* and defines levels of service delivery for roads.

Planning

The Asset Plan required by the *Local Government Act 2020* has been completed and endorsed by Council. This will be updated every four years in accordance with the legislation. There are a number of internal supporting documents to the plan which detail what is required throughout the asset lifecycle including maintenance and renewal of assets. These are regularly reviewed and updated as required. Proposed capital works are aligned to the Asset Plan and supporting documents and the process for projects to be endorsed by Council is supported by the Asset Management and Service Delivery team.

Information and Technology

All asset information is captured into a corporate register to enable whole of life cycle asset management. Council has an asset management system, incorporating works management and strategic asset planning functionality, which provides a single integrated solution for all organisational asset data needs and improves data capture, record keeping and predictive modelling processes across the organisation.

A sustainable data capture and condition assessment program has also been implemented to meet asset management requirements. This system supports predictive modelling, assisting Council to make long term decisions based on condition, functionality and capacity of the assets over the whole of the assets lifecycle.



City Improvement Program

The City Improvement Program (CIP) is Council's ongoing program for the renewal, upgrade, expansion and creation of assets including, but not limited to, buildings, roads, stormwater drainage, parks, artwork, and library books. It consists of programs driven by Council's asset management plans and strategies, major projects (such as the Keysborough Community Hub) and community initiated requests.

The yearly CIP budget is determined within Council's annual budget formulation process and the size of this budget depends on the funds available relative to other Council commitments.

Once the budget is approved, the majority of projects are planned, designed and delivered by 30 June each year. In 2024–25, Council invested and delivered \$60 million in capital expenditure across a variety of assets as shown on the below chart.

The annual building renewal program delivering upgrades across several Council owned buildings was completed.

A total of 81 road segments were improved, including 66 segments resurfaced and 15 segments rehabilitated or reconstructed. The Federal Blackspot Program was delivered at Athol Road, Brady Road, Railway Parade, View Road and Woodlee Street.

Community Relations

Advocacy

A key advocacy activity for the 2024–25 financial year was engagement with Federal Members of Parliament and candidates for the three municipal electorates of Bruce, Hotham and Issacs in the lead up to the May 2025 Federal election and Budget announcement.

To support this engagement an advocacy pack was created as an interim document to ensure Council didn't miss the opportunity to advocate for our community on identified priorities covering four broad themes. These themes were:

- · Building vibrant and connected communities
- · Safer and healthier living
- · Tackling key social issues
- · Transforming Greater Dandenong.

These priorities can be found on Council's website www.greaterdandenong.vic.gov.au/advocacy/advocacy-priorities-2025-federal-election

As a result of these advocacy efforts significant commitments were secured by the returning Government for the three municipal electorates and include:

- \$1,600,000 for CCTV upgrades in Noble Park and Dandenong.
- \$900,000 for Ross Reserve amenity upgrades and construction of female inclusive changerooms, and a shade structure for the athletic track.
- \$400,000 to upgrade the sports field lighting at Fotheringham Reserve.
- \$1.5 million to deliver a new Dandenong Employment Hub.
- \$370,000 to build cricket nets, upgrade cricket wickets and install four coaches' boxes at Greaves Reserve.
- \$1.1 million for Dandenong Park playground, Lois Twohig Reserve paths, Tirhatuan Park sensory trail and upgrades at Police Paddocks Reserve relevant to the Disability Discrimination Act.

• \$225,000 over three years for Dandenong Ramadan Night Market.

Council remains steadfast in its commitment to advocating for additional local initiatives that serve the interests of our community. We will continue working towards a more prosperous future, striving to enhance Greater Dandenong as an outstanding place to live, work, and visit.

Projects

Key advocacy projects for 2024–25 included the following:

Back Your Neighbour – The Mayoral and Councillor Taskforce Supporting People Seeking Asylum's Back Your Neighbour campaign has grown in support with new Councils and community partners joining in the advocacy to the Federal Government for fair and compassionate policies for people seeking asylum. Council has been proactively leading strategic, direct lobbying with a cross-section of stakeholders during the Federal election campaign, collaborating with the refugee sector and peak bodies, raising awareness via public events and growing the membership of the Taskforce.

Anti-Poverty – Council advanced its Anti-Poverty Strategy and the "Poverty is everyone's business" campaign through strong collaboration with the Anti-Poverty Consortium. The Consortium secured a \$12,000 Game Change Grant to deliver a co-designed skill building workshop series, and a working group was appointed to develop a survey capturing lived experiences of housing hardship.

Gambling – Council maintained a strong partnership with the Alliance for Gambling Reform, contributing data and insights to support advocacy and public education efforts, and contributing to Alliance campaigns for gambling reform. A detailed summary of gambling patterns in Victoria was distributed to guide strategic planning, and efforts were made to enhance public messaging in collaboration with other councils. The year concluded with the release of an updated report on gambling issues in Greater Dandenong and discussions with the Victorian Gambling and Casino Control Commission to explore joint public education initiatives.

Submissions

Where relevant, Council makes submissions to parliamentary enquiries or government reviews to support better outcomes for our community. This year these included contributions to the Federal Government's Multicultural Framework Review, a submission to Infrastructure Victoria's 30 Year Strategy made in collaboration with the Regional Charter Group of Councils, and a submission to the Victorian Legislative Council Legal and Social Issues Committee Enquiry into food security in Victoria.

Advocacy also occurs through the Municipal Association of Victoria (MAV) State Council and the Australian Local Government Association (ALGA) National General Assembly. This year endorsed initiatives included:

- Supporting People Seeking Asylum within our communities.
- Increasing financial sustainability of local governments.
- Increased funding support for Council's Emergency Management obligations.
- Advocacy for a strong and competitive Victorian manufacturing industry.
- Restoring the level of Financial Assistance Grants.
- Implementing recommendations of the Independent Review of Commonwealth Disaster Funding.

Refining our advocacy processes

Throughout this year Council continued to refine its advocacy processes guided by its endorsed Strategic Advocacy Framework, which can be found on Council's website www. greaterdandenong.vic.gov.au/strategic-advocacy-framework. This provides direction for a coordinated and strategic approach to setting Council's annual advocacy priorities and subsequent action plans.

The Framework has been utilised to formulate the 40 endorsed advocacy priorities for 2025–26 aligned against the objectives and priorities of the now endorsed Council Plan 2025–29. Each identified priority requires differing levels of effort and engagement.

Three priority campaigns, Back Your Neighbour, Anti-Poverty, and Housing were identified for the coming year, demonstrating Council's commitment to sustained, strategic, and values-led advocacy.

Health and Wellbeing in Our Community

Greater Dandenong City Council incorporated the Municipal Public Health and Wellbeing Plan (MPHWP) into the Council Plan 2021–25.

The MPHWP is a requirement under the *Public Health and Wellbeing Act 2008*, which states that all Councils must develop a four-year plan within 12 months of each general election of Council.

The MPHWP for 2021–25 outlines how Council will improve and prioritise health and wellbeing by focusing on the priority areas:

- Active living
- · Physical health and mental wellbeing
- Tobacco, alcohol and other drugs
- · Social cohesion and community safety
- · Climate change and health.

Key achievements from the 2024–25 reporting period are outlined below:

Active living

- Implementation of the 'Make Your Move'
 Greater Dandenong Physical Activity Strategy
 2020–30 continued, with key initiatives including
 the GO Soccer Mums program, volleyball
 and basketball programs and a focus on
 empowering women.
- As part of the Open Space Strategy 2020–30

 a number of new and improved assets are
 now available for the community to use and
 enjoy, increasing the range of recreational
 opportunities available to residents throughout
 the municipality.
- A formal memorandum of understanding has been established between Council, City In the Community and Melbourne City Football Club to facilitate a range of social, community and football outcomes and improve the health and wellbeing of the community.

Physical health and mental wellbeing

- Council collaborated with the Department of Health, Monash Health, Women's Health in the South East, the South East Public Health Unit and other health stakeholders within the local prevention system to improve the strategic planning of local health and wellbeing priorities.
- The VicHealth Local Government Partnership has continued to be delivered, with a range of health promotion programs implemented to improve children and young people's physical and mental wellbeing.
- Council continued to deliver aged and disability services, as well as supporting the mental and physical health of children, young people and families through a range of preventative health initiatives and responsive interventions.
- Council's Reconciliation Action Plan has continued to be successfully implemented both internally and in collaboration with community partners including Bunurong Land Council, the Victorian Aboriginal Child Care Agency, the City of Casey and Casey Gathering Place. These initiatives have contributed to Greater Dandenong receiving a number of recent awards and recognition.
- The Indigenous Health Care Program New Directions Project delivered healthy eating, anti-smoking, hearing checks, oral health checks and immunisation initiatives to Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander families.

Tobacco, alcohol and other drugs

- Council has worked collaboratively with local health stakeholders on the regional expert advisory group for reducing vaping (e-cigarettes) and tobacco use and related harms.
- Party Safe workshops were delivered to schools, educating young people about strategies to minimise alcohol-related harm and the uptake and use of vape/tobacco and other drugs.
- Council continued to coordinate tobacco control activities and inspections at outdoor dining venues, retail venues, hospitals, Council's sporting facilities, and festivals and events in accordance with the Municipal Association of Victoria guidelines with high compliance rates being achieved.

Social cohesion and community safety

- A dedicated Community Safety Unit has been established within Council with a draft Community Safety Plan to inform the direction of priorities and a collaboration of efforts with partnership agencies, stakeholders and the wider community.
- Council successfully delivered 10 major festivals and events engaging a total of 69,374 attendees.
- Council contributed to the establishment of the South East Anti-Racism Support Network, supported a Pride March, celebrated Refugee Week, offered activities at the Drum Theatre and facilitated public art exhibitions. These events and programs celebrated the cultural diversity in Greater Dandenong and promoted inclusivity within our municipality.
- Council continued to collaborate and work in partnership with local stakeholders to support and advocate for vulnerable families and community. This effort included a range of projects aimed to prevent and address family violence, gambling, gender equity, poverty and homelessness.

Climate Change and Sustainability

Greater Dandenong City Council's Council Plan 2021–25 identifies six key strategic objectives. These include "A socially connected, safe and healthy city" and "A green city committed to a sustainable future".

Taking Action on the Climate Emergency

Recognising that climate change is the greatest challenge of our time, Council formally acknowledged a 'Climate and Ecological Emergency' in January 2020, committing us to emergency action on climate change.

Over the last 12 months, Council has been busy implementing many of the actions contained within the climate and sustainability strategies.

Progress to Net Zero

Significant progress has been made towards Council's net zero target. In the last 5 years, Council has reduced its operational emissions by 17,000 tonnes of carbon emissions which is a reduction of over 80 per cent.

To achieve this, Council has successfully delivered the VECO Power Purchase Agreement avoiding approx. 11,000 tonnes of emissions per year, delivered 600kW of solar panels across Council buildings, and continued our transition of small gas appliances in Council buildings. Council's electric fleet continues to grow as well with three new electric trucks on the way for our Parks, Works and Cleansing crews.

Council is continuing its commitment and journey to net zero, by decommissioning one of our biggest emitters, Dandenong Oasis.

Dandenong Oasis will be replaced with the fully electric Dandenong Wellbeing Centre which will commence construction in 2025–26.

Leading Innovation at Keysborough Community Hub

Council is leading the way in innovation towards a greener future with the installation of a state-of-the-art heating and cooling system at the new Keysborough Community Hub. A high-efficiency air cooled propane heat pump will provide centralised heating and cooling. This pioneering system is believed to be among the first of its kind in Australia. By opting for natural refrigerants like propane and CO₂ instead of conventional high-GWP synthetic refrigerants, the facility will lower its global warming potential (GWP) from around 1,500 to only three. The Keysborough Community Hub will be opening later in the year.

Tree Canopy Grows

The urban forest continues to grow with Council planting 2,389 new trees in priority locations across the municipality. Pruning works were also undertaken on over 24,000 trees, putting strong emphasis on proactive maintenance for risk reduction.

At a community level, the One Tree Per Child event engaged 275 Grade 3 students and distributed over 1,000 trees. The Adopt-a-Park program engaged 220 children and planted 3,900 native and indigenous plants across six local reserves.

Green Wedge Giveaway

Council continues to protect and support the green wedge and its residents. This year a plant giveaway enabled 24 landholders to revegetate with 3,600 native and indigenous plants and trees handed out.

Caring for Biodiversity

Targeted revegetation has continued with a focus on habitat enhancement across priority corridors. This has included intensive weed control across 83.78 hectares, revegetation of 2.72 hectares and more than 22,000 indigenous plants installed. Council is proud to report this has been possible through a collaborative effort between Council and the community with a blend of grant funded projects, community events, and school based initiatives.

Kerbside Waste Diversion Achievements

Council successfully diverted 46.46% percent of household waste from landfill through its kerbside waste services. This included the recovery of over 11,300 tonnes of mixed recyclables via yellow-lidded bins and more than 12,800 tonnes of food and garden organics through green-lidded bins.

Mixed recyclables collected through the kerbside waste service are recycled and turned into new products, while food and garden waste is turned into nutrient-rich compost used in Victorian farms and gardens, contributing to more sustainable and circular economy solutions.

Council Reuse-Recycle Drop-Off Days

Each year, Council hosts four Reuse-Recycle Drop-Off Days, offering residents an opportunity to dispose of unwanted household items at no cost and reduce waste sent to landfill. This year 1,656 vehicles were in attendance, recovering a total of 63 tonnes of items for reuse and recycling. These events accept bulky items suitable for donation, as well as electronic and household items appropriate for recycling.

Community Education Programs

Council delivered 52 waste education incursions across schools and early learning centres, engaging nearly 1,300 students. These sessions focused on topics like waste minimisation, recycle right at school and at home, and setting up recycling and composting programs at schools.

Additionally, Council facilitated 68 community education and engagement sessions, with over 2,000 participants in attendance. Held at venues such as Noble Park Community House, Dandenong Market, and Chisholm Institute, these sessions covered a range of topics such as recycling right at home, understanding circular economy, and waste education.

Sustainability Festival

The annual Sustainability Festival took place on 23 February 2025 at the iconic Dandenong Market. The festival focused on the topic of 'do more with less'. From crafts to planting, searching for water bugs to facepainting, enjoying local and cultural performances while using pedal power to blend your own smoothie, there were opportunities for everyone to get involved and have a great time, while learning tips to live more sustainably.

Op Shop Trail Competition

In the weeks leading up to the Sustainability Festival, Greater Dandenong held its first Op Shop Trail. This ran from 10 January to 10 February and had over 100 participants. The Op Shop Trail helped residents and visitors explore our local neighbourhoods, while also reducing textile waste. Many of the participants shared helpful feedback and that they were impressed

with how well stocked the stores were. We are looking forward to holding another Op Shop trail in 2026.

Sustainable development – planning applications

Over 200 sustainability referrals for planning permit applications were completed in 2024–25, ensuring best practice environmentally sustainable design principles were incorporated into a broad range of private developments across Greater Dandenong.

Disability Action Plan

Council continues to implement the Disability Action Plan while work progresses on developing a new plan. The Disability Advisory Committee remains central to this process, actively contributing to community engagement and shaping the direction of the new plan. Key areas of focus have included:

- Enhancing the use of current and emerging technologies to support people with disability
- Addressing the needs of people with disability who are not eligible for the National Disability Insurance Scheme (NDIS)
- Strengthening leadership opportunities for people with disability
- Collaborating with people with disability from culturally and linguistically diverse (CALD) backgrounds.

Disability Advisory Committee (DAC) – Consultation

The DAC continues to provide valuable input into Council strategies and policies, particularly in response to changes in disability-related programs at the Commonwealth, State, and Local Government levels. In 2024–25, the Committee contributed to strategies including:

- · Enhancing community safety
- Shifting community attitudes towards greater inclusion of people with disability
- · Improving access to the built environment
- · Increasing accessibility of public transport.

Community Participation

Council promoted a variety of inclusive events and initiatives to encourage community participation by people with disability, including:

- Make Your Move All Abilities Sports Day, featuring inclusive sports such as cricket, powerchair sports, pickleball and karate
- Disability Services Expo, showcasing local support services
- Ongoing meetings of the VALID Peer Action Group and Chronic Pain Support Group, fostering community connection and peer support
- An International Day of People with Disability celebration, delivered in partnership with Noble Park Community Centre, Noble Park Aquatic Centre, Burke & Beyond, Reclink, and ADEC attracting over 200 attendees with stalls, food, music and activities.

Council also participated in several expos and forums to raise awareness of its inclusive practices and commitment to accessibility.

The Hidden Disability Sunflower program was rolled out across Council, with libraries and customer service centres serving as key points for face-to-face engagement and support.

National Disability Insurance Scheme (NDIS)

Council continued to monitor developments in the NDIS and assess their impact on local programs and community needs. Community members contributed to consultations on the development of foundational supports for people with disability who are not eligible for the NDIS.

Staff Training

Disability awareness training remains a core component of Council's induction for new staff. Ongoing professional development includes:

- The YouMeUs online training program, developed by Southern Region local governments
- Training aligned with the Hidden Disability Sunflower initiative
- Autism Awareness Training, now part of Council's internal training calendar.

Support for Carers

The Carers Walk program at Noble Park Community Centre continued to grow, offering carers opportunities to connect, improve wellbeing, access support and build skills. Participation increased steadily throughout the year.

Accessible Built Environment

Council engaged people with lived experience of disability in the planning and design of key projects, including the Dandenong Wellbeing Centre, Keysborough Hub and various open space developments. Community members also raised access issues through platforms such as Snap Send Solve, the DAC and direct contact with Council helping to improve the accessibility of public spaces.

Community Satisfaction

In 2025 Council achieved a record performance rating in its annual community satisfaction survey. Residents rated Council's overall performance at 7.5 (out of 10), 13 per cent higher than our 2024 score, and 4 per cent higher than the average for metropolitan councils.

This year's survey was undertaken by Metropolis Research and was carried out through 400 door-to-door, in-person interviews across April and May 2025. Metropolis Research found the overall performance rating was the highest satisfaction score recorded across metropolitan Melbourne councils they surveyed in 2025.

Services where Council outperformed other metropolitan councils included:

- Services for older people (+9 per cent)
- Arts, cultural events, programs and activities (+8 per cent)
- Services for children (+7 per cent)
- Council festivals and events (+5 per cent)
- Council's website (+5 per cent).

Community Grants Programs

Greater Dandenong City Council's Community
Grants Programs are designed to strengthen
the community by supporting initiatives that
are inclusive, diverse, and responsive to
local needs. The grants programs encourage
active community participation, alignment with
Council's strategic objectives, foster partnerships
to address social disadvantage, strengthen
local organisations, promote intercultural
understanding, and enhance access and inclusion
for all residents.

In December 2023, Council endorsed a revised Community Grants Program Policy, introducing three streamlined categories – Small, Medium, and Large – to replace the previous Community Response, Support, and Partnership grants. This reform simplifies access for applicants, enhances transparency, and ensures funding is targeted to initiatives that align with Council's strategic objectives, including:

- Strengthening social inclusion and community wellbeing.
- Advancing gender equity and intercultural understanding.
- Supporting climate action and environmental sustainability.
- Promoting arts, culture, and community connection.
- Building capacity in local organisations and services.

Small Grants Program

Open year-round, the Small Grants program provides flexible, responsive funding to individuals and grassroots organisations. It supports participation in elite opportunities, community group activities, entry-level engagement, and local projects that foster inclusion and wellbeing. This year:

- Total amount allocated: \$121,336
- Number of recipients: over 100 individuals and groups.
- Key themes: cultural celebrations, youth engagement, seniors' wellbeing, sports participation, and creative initiatives.

There are four grant categories under this program:

- Individual Achievement Grants (up to \$500): supports residents of Greater Dandenong with grant funding to assist participation in elite opportunities, either competitive sports, artistic, or award and recognition.

Medium Grants Program

Delivered in two rounds annually, the Medium Grants Program supports one-off projects, events, and programs that deliver measurable benefits to the Greater Dandenong community. Funding is capped at \$10,000 per organisation per financial year.

- Total amount allocated: \$302.928
- Focus areas: community development, climate action, arts and festivals, and individual artist support
- Highlights: projects addressing refugee settlement, youth empowerment, environmental education, and cultural festivals.

There are four grant categories under this program:

• Community Development Grants (up to \$10,000): Support not-for-profit community groups and organisations deliver initiatives that build community capacity, promote social inclusion, foster healthy partnerships and community health and wellbeing, prevent family violence, advance gender equity, and enhance community harmony and participation.

- Climate Change Action Grants (up to \$5,000): Fund projects by local small not-for-profit community groups, organisations and schools that deliver environmental benefits and support Council's climate action goals.
- Arts, Festivals and Events Grants (up to \$10,000): Enable not-for-profit community groups and organisations to deliver arts, festivals and cultural events that promote community connection, cross-cultural exchange, and celebrate diversity.
- Individual Artist Grants (up to \$5,000): Support individuals to develop communitybased projects that reflect local needs and foster community engagement.

- Total amount allocated: \$1,238,132
- Categories: Partnership Grants, Strategic Project Grants, and Festivals and Events Sponsorships
- Impact: Strengthened service delivery in areas such as homelessness, employment pathways, family violence prevention, and community resilience.

Large Grants Program categories:

- Partnership Grants (up to \$50,000 per annum): Support ongoing operations of not-for-profit organisations delivering essential services aligned with Council's strategic objectives and build community capacity, social inclusion, and healthy partnerships.
- Strategic Project Grants (up to \$80,000 per annum): Provide up to two years of funding to not-for-profit organisations for self-identified projects, initiatives and activities that directly contribute outcomes towards the delivery of Council's strategic health and wellbeing priorities.
- Festivals and Events Sponsorship Grants (up to \$40,000 per annum): Offer not-for-profit organisations up to two years funding for events that deliver social, environmental or economic benefits to the city.

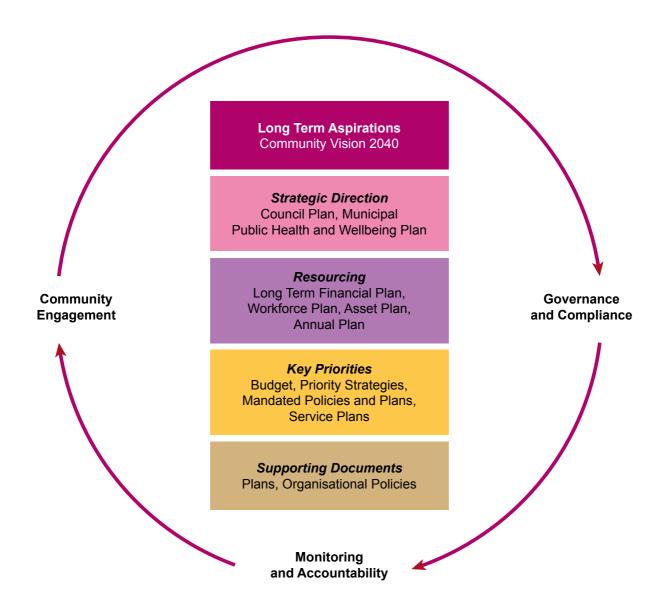

Performance Measurement and Reporting

In 2024–25 Council regularly monitored its performance via quarterly performance reports which covered the financial and performance targets outlined in the Council Plan, Annual Plan and Annual Budget. The Annual Report provides a comprehensive overview of Council's activities.

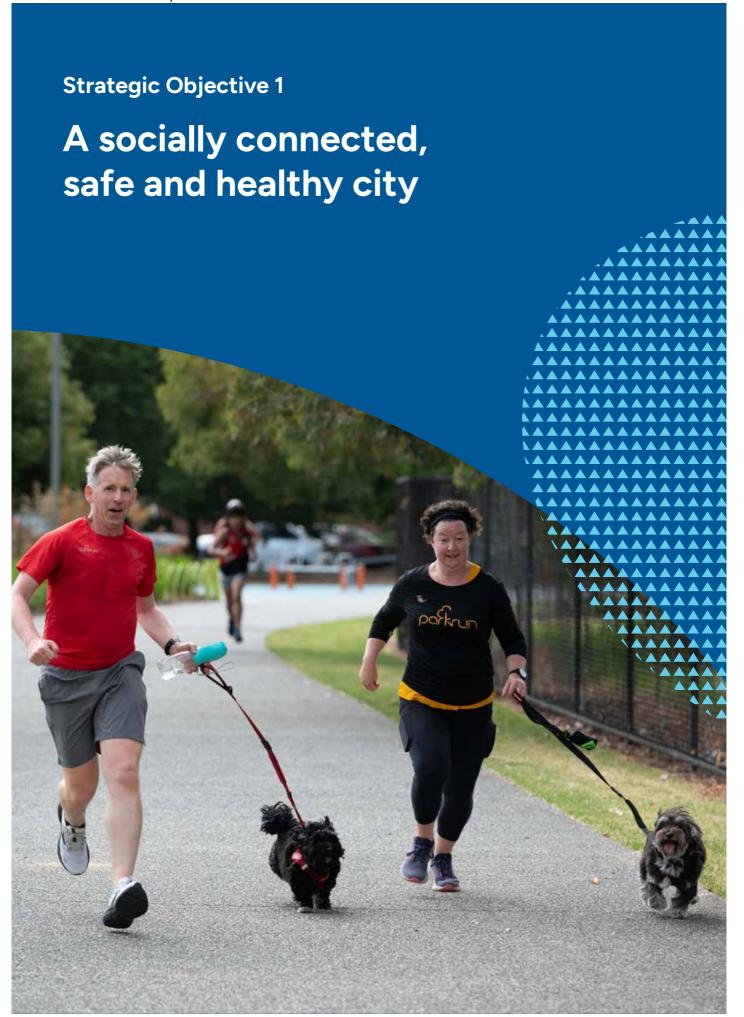
Local Government Performance Reporting Framework (LGPRF)

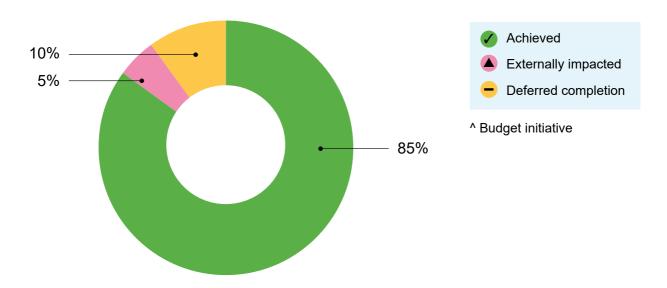
- The contract for the Dandenong Wellbeing Centre was awarded, Council's single largest investment in health, wellbeing, inclusion and water safety.

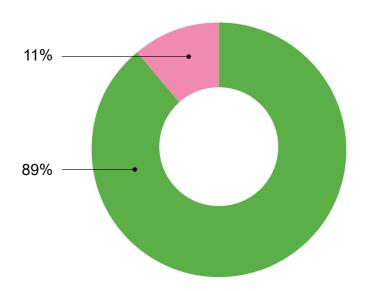

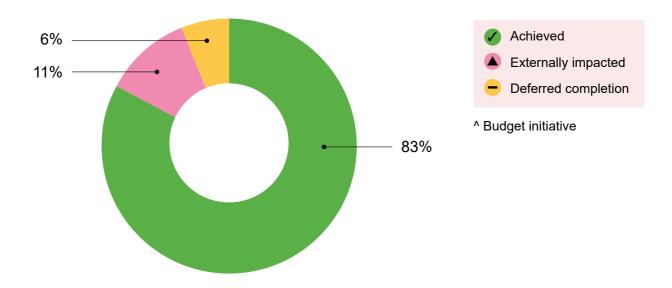

- (d) Demolition costs for the Precinct Energy Plant (PEP) building were incurred following the identification of structural deficiencies that rendered the facility unsuitable for public use. The project was funded through internal reserves, ensuring responsible financial management while addressing safety concerns.

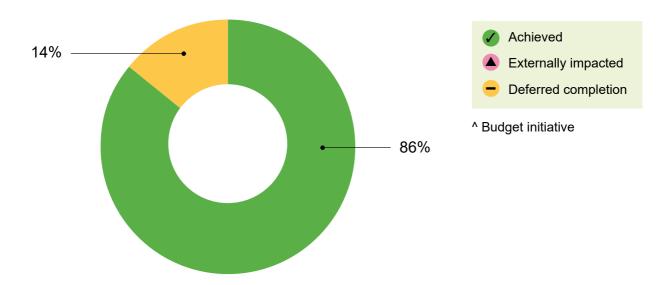

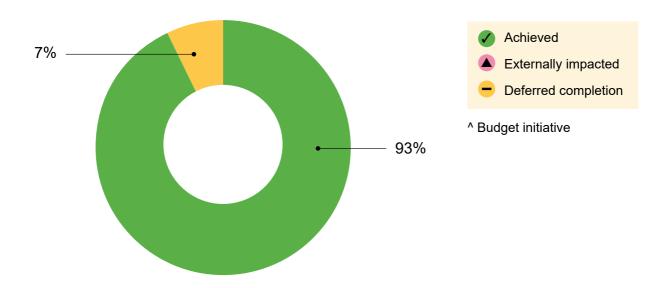

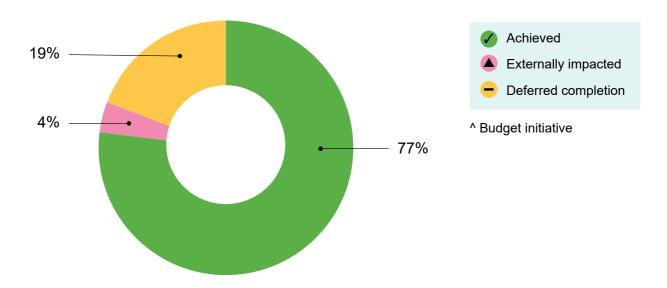

Basis for Opinion

I have conducted my audit in accordance with the *Audit Act 1994* which incorporates the Australian Standards on Assurance Engagements. Greater Dandenong has a population of over 167,000 people and is the most multicultural municipality in Australia, with residents from over 150 different birthplaces. This adds a wealth of diversity to the city through a range of cultural experiences. The city has a vibrant economy in both the retail and manufacturing sectors and is renowned as the manufacturing hub of Victoria. The wholesale trade, health care, and retail trade sectors also provide a significant proportion of employment opportunities.

5.1 Basis of preparation

Council is required to prepare and include a performance statement within its annual report. The performance statement includes the results of the prescribed service performance, financial performance and sustainable capacity indicators and measures together with a description of the municipal district and an explanation of material variations in the results and notes to the accounts. This statement has been prepared to meet the requirements of the *Local Government Act 2020* and *Local Government (Planning and Reporting) Regulations 2020*.

Where applicable the results in the performance statement have been prepared on accounting bases consistent with those reported in the Financial Statements. The other results are based on information drawn from council information systems or from third parties (e.g. Australian Bureau of Statistics or the Council's satisfaction survey provider).

The performance statement presents the actual results for the current year and the previous three years, along with the current year's target, if mandated by the *Local Government (Planning and Reporting) Regulations 2020.* Additionally, for the prescribed financial performance indicators and measures, the performance statement includes the target budget for the current year and the results forecast for the period 2025–26 to 2028–29 as published in Council's Budget and Long Term Financial Plan (copies can be obtained by contacting Council).

The Local Government (Planning and Reporting) Regulations 2020 requires explanation of any material variations in the results contained in the performance statement. Council has adopted materiality thresholds relevant to each indicator and measure and explanations have not been provided for variations below the materiality thresholds unless the variance is considered to be material because of its nature.

5.3 Other matters

Overview of 2025

During the 2024–25 financial year, Council achieved stronger-than-expected interest returns on investments, driven by sustained high interest rates and increased cash holdings. These higher cash balances were largely due to delays in delivering multi-year capital projects.

The 2024–25 year was governed by a rate cap of 2.75%, reflecting the broader inflationary pressures affecting both organisations and households. Despite this constraint, progress continued on key infrastructure projects, including the completion of the Keysborough Community Hub in July 2025 and ongoing development of the Dandenong Wellbeing Centre.

Operating grants were higher than the previous year, largely due to the timing of Financial Assistance grant distributions, contributing to a more favourable financial outcome. This was partially offset by increased depreciation expenses, following the componentisation of building assets.

Understanding the Financial Report

Financial Overview

Interpreting Council's financial performance through financial statements prepared in accordance with Australian Accounting Standards can often be complex. This overview aims to provide greater clarity and insight into the financial outcomes for the 2024-25 financial year, helping readers better understand the key results and what they mean for our community.

Council's financial statements present a consolidated view of its financial performance, including the results of entities over which Council has control. This includes Dandenong Market Pty Ltd and South East Leisure Pty Ltd, whose operations are governed by Council to deliver community benefits.

The statements have been prepared in accordance with the Local Government Model Financial Report, as required by the Local Government (Planning and Reporting) Regulations 2020 and the Local Government Act 2020. This ensures consistency, transparency, and compliance with Australian Accounting Standards.

Council recorded a surplus of \$30.91 million for the 2024-25 financial year, a significant increase compared to the \$12.29 million surplus in 2023-24. It's important to note that this result is influenced by a mix of factors – some are recurring operational items, while others are more variable and can fluctuate significantly from year to year. This overview aims to help readers understand the key drivers behind the surplus and the broader financial context.

In 2024-25, Council delivered a strong financial result, supported by early grant funding, favourable investment returns and reduced operating costs in some areas due to non-recurring factors. Delays in multi-year capital projects contributed to increased cash holdings, which, combined with sustained high interest rates, boosted revenue. The broader economic environment – marked by high inflation and interest rates – had mixed effects, benefiting investment income but increasing borrowing costs and dampening development activity in some areas.

Council continued to invest in key infrastructure, including progressing the Keysborough Community Hub and Dandenong Wellbeing Centre major capital projects. Council's commitment for the 2025-26 year is to continue to invest in services and infrastructure in a financially responsible way by balancing the needs of our community while achieving long term financial sustainability.

It should be kept in mind that the surplus for the year is not a cash-based result but remains an accounting surplus which includes capital grants and contributions but excludes net asset revaluation increments.

A comprehensive review of Council's asset valuations in 2024-25 resulted in a significant revaluation increase of \$373 million, contributing to a \$404 million surplus in the Comprehensive Income Statement. The uplift was driven by improvements in valuation methods, including more detailed assessments of asset features, location, and updated construction inputs. Key asset classes such as drainage, footpaths, cycleways, off-street car parks, and roads saw notable increases. These changes reflect both market conditions and updates to accounting standards. For further details, refer to Note 6.2 of the Financial Report.

Comprehensive Income Statement

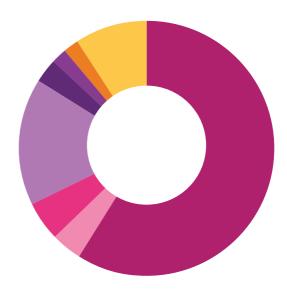
This Statement shows:

- The sources of Council's revenue under various income headings.
- The expenses incurred in running the Council during the year. These expenses relate only to the operations and do not include the cost associated with capital purchases or the building of assets. While capital purchase costs are not included in the expenses there is an item for 'Depreciation'. This is the value of the assets 'used up' during the year.

Income

The consolidated operating income for 2024-25 was \$305.54 million (\$272.60 million in 2023-24) including rates and charges income (\$178.13 million), fees, charges and fines (\$26.67 million), operating grants (\$48.78 million), capital grants (\$9.68 million), monetary contributions (\$7.15 million), contributions of non-monetary assets, mainly from subdivision activity (\$6.00 million), net gain on disposal of property, infrastructure, plant and equipment (\$1.39 million) and other income (\$27.56 million). The breakdown of operating income by major categories is depicted in the graph following:

Rates and charges income (including waste collection charges) – general rate income is based on the Capital Improved Value of properties and a 'rate in the dollar' is applied against each category of property. Waste collection charges are based on full cost recovery including the State Government waste levy, the number of bins and frequency of collections. Refer note 3.1 of Financial Report for further details on rate income.

Fees, charges and fines – Income from these sources were \$26.67 million for the year (\$25.06 million in 2023-24). The major sources of income are:

As can be seen from the above table, statutory fees, fines, and parking revenue increased compared to the previous year, reflecting a higher number of infringements issued and a recovery in business activity across the municipality.

Grants

Where grants have specific performance obligations that have not yet been satisfied at 30 June, the income has been recognised as unearned income in the Balance Sheet (refer note 5.3(c)) of the Financial Report).

Grants operating - operational grant income mainly comprises tied grants across multiple ongoing and non-recurrent programs, mainly in Community Strengthening. Council's most significant single source of grant funding is the Financial Assistance Grant received via the Victoria Local Government Grants Commission of around \$12-13 million per annum. Operating grant income increased significantly in 2024-25, largely due to the timing of the Financial Assistance Grant payments. 2025 includes 150% of these grant allocations (100% of 2024-25 and 50% of 2025-26 distributed early) and 2024 had 0% of these grant allocations as 100% of the 2023-24 allocation was distributed early in 2022-23. These payments can vary year to year depending on early distribution practices. Additional grant income was also recognised following the finalisation of the Regional Assessment Service program and prior year acquittal outcomes of the Commonwealth Home Support Programme.

Grants capital – capital grants recognised of \$9.68 million (2023-24: \$8.28). These grants are mainly non-recurrent in nature essentially for the purposes of funding specific capital projects and are expended on these services in addition to the funds allocated by Council from other sources of revenue. Capital grant income is recognised in the Income Statement as the performance obligations are satisfied (generally as capital expenditure is incurred). The \$1.4 million increase in capital grant income is due primarily to higher funding recognised for the Roads to Recovery program and Dandenong Wellbeing Centre project compared to the prior year. Refer to note 5.3(c) of the Financial Report for further details.

Contributions

Contributions monetary – Council received increased monetary contributions in 2024-25, primarily driven by \$3.99 million in open space contributions (transferred to reserves) and \$2.9 million contribution income from the Development Contributions Plan (DCP). The uplift reflects both stronger development activity and the completion of key capital project milestones for Perry Road stages 1 and 2.

Contributions non-monetary – Capital non-monetary contributions of \$6.00 million were mainly from "gifted" land and infrastructure assets from subdivisions and developer activity.

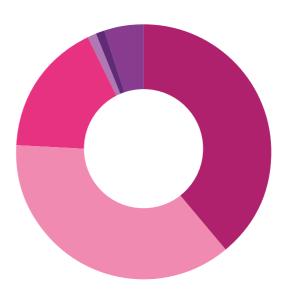
Other income (\$27.56 million) – This comprises a number of income sources including Dandenong Market revenue from operations, recoveries, property rental, interest received on investments and other sundry income.

Expenditure

Total operating expenditure for 2024-25 including depreciation was \$274.63 million (\$260.32 million in 2023-24).

Depreciation (\$47.64 million) – The depreciation expense reflects the diminution in the value of assets due to wear and tear and obsolescence. It has no impact on the cash position of Council. Cash flow is impacted only at the time of purchase and sale of assets.

Amortisation – intangible assets (\$20,000) – This expense item reflects the amortisation of computer software assets.

Depreciation – right of use assets (\$661,000) – This expense item reflects the depreciation of

leased (right of use) assets. Refer note 5.8 of Financial Report for further breakdown.

Allowance for impairment losses

(\$2.74 million) – Mainly relates to provisions recognised for bad and doubtful debts during the year for parking fine debtors (\$1.92 million) and other debtors (\$771,000). The provision for doubtful debts is recognised on an expected credit loss model. This model considers both historical and forward-looking information in determining the level of impairment.

Borrowing costs (\$2.67 million) – Represents interest on Council's long-term borrowings.

Finance costs – leases (\$28,000) – Relates to the interest on lease liabilities.

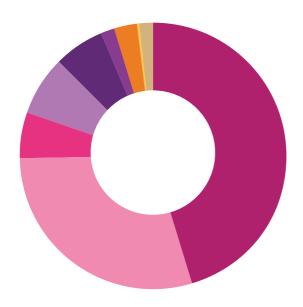
Fair value adjustment for investment property (\$175,000) – This is a non-cash item and relates to several land and building assets classified as 'Investment property' as they are held primarily to earn rental income. Australian Accounting Standards require any revaluation of these assets to fair value to be recognised in the Comprehensive Income Statement, rather than in the Asset Revaluation Reserve like other fixed assets held at fair value by Council.



Capital Expenditure (as per the Capital Works Statement)

Council spent \$60.69 million on capital expenditure during the year. This comprises upgrade (\$7.08 million), renewal (\$24.71 million) and new asset expenditure (\$28.90 million).

Balance Sheet

The Balance Sheet discloses Council's net worth and clearly defines what the Council owns as assets and what it owes as liabilities. Assets and liabilities are further separated into current and non-current categories. Current assets or current liabilities are those which will fall due in the next 12 months or cannot be deferred for greater than 12 months.

Net assets or total equity represents Council's accumulated net worth and includes many infrastructure and community assets such as land, buildings, parks, roads and drains.

The components of the Balance Sheet include:

Current and non-current assets

- Cash and cash equivalents include cash and investments, i.e., cash held in the bank and in petty cash and the market value of Council's investments (where the maturity term is less than 90 days).
- Trade and other receivables are monies owed to Council by ratepayers and others.
- Other financial assets relate to term deposits held by Council with original maturity greater than 90 days.
- Other assets are prepayments of next year's expenses and monies owed to Council, other than from trading, that is not yet received, combined with any inventory or stock on hand at balance date.
- Property, infrastructure, plant and equipment is the largest component of Council's worth and represents the value of all the land, buildings, roads, vehicles, equipment, etc. which has been built up by Council over many years.
- Investment property represents land and building assets that are held for the primary purpose of earning rental income.
- Right-of-use assets represent leased assets.
 Includes property, fleet, IT and office equipment that have been leased under ordinary lease arrangements.
- Intangible assets represent computer software assets.

Current and non-current liabilities

- Trade and other payables are the value to which Council owes money as at 30 June.
- Trust funds and deposits represent monies held in trust by Council.
- Contract and other liabilities (unearned income) relates to revenue transactions where Council provides services or goods under contractual arrangements with specific performance obligations which have not been satisfied at balance date. This comprises mainly Development Contribution Plan contributions and grant agreements.
- Provisions include leave entitlements and landfill restoration works.
- Lease liabilities represent the lease repayment obligations for leased (right of use) assets and are classified as current and non-current based on when the obligation is expected to occur. Includes repayments for property, fleet, IT and office equipment that have been leased under ordinary lease arrangements.

Net assets

This term is used to describe the difference between the value of total assets and the value of total liabilities. It represents the net worth of Council as at 30 June.

Total equity

This always equals net assets. It is made up of the following components:

 Accumulated surplus: this is the value of the Council, other than the asset revaluation reserve and other reserves that has been accumulated over time. Reserves: this includes asset revaluation reserve and other reserves. Asset revaluation reserve is the value by which the purchase cost of assets has changed over the years and arises as assets valued at fair value are revalued to their replacement cost from time to time. Other reserves include both statutory reserves and discretionary reserves. The statutory reserves apply where funds are gained from the application of legislative requirements to contribute – and where expenditure of the funds is not entirely discretionary (i.e., the funds need to be used for certain expenditure only). These funds are held for future expenditure.

Council's financial position increased by \$403.67 million during the year, made up of a surplus of \$30.91 million and net asset revaluation increments of \$372.76 million. The difference between the assets and liabilities amounting to \$3.13 billion is the net worth of the Council to its ratepayers and community (\$2.72 billion in 2023-24).

Council's borrowings at 30 June 2025 was \$48.37 million, which is 27% of rates and charges revenue (Government prudential limit is 80%). Loan repayments of \$34.54 million are forecast over the next five years under Council's borrowing strategy, as Council intends to draw down an additional \$68.85 million in new borrowings over the next two years to fund the Dandenong Wellbeing Centre major capital project. Council will retire existing debts through cash flows generated from operations and a reduction in the capital program will fund the debt servicing costs of the new borrowings.

Statement of Changes in Equity

During the course of the year the value of total equity, as set out in the Balance Sheet, changes. This Statement shows the values of such changes and how these changes arose. The main reasons for a change in equity stem from:

- Net asset revaluation movement reflects the change in the replacement value of assets.
- The surplus for the year is the value that income exceeded operating costs as described in the Comprehensive Income Statement.
- Transfers to or from Council's reserves reflect funds withdrawn for use during the year or allocated for future expenditure.

Cash Flow Statement

The Cash Flow Statement summarises Council's cash payments and cash receipts for the year. This Statement is presented according to a very specific Australian Accounting Standard and needs some care in analysis. It excludes noncash expenses such as depreciation but includes payments in relation to capital works projects, proceeds from assets sales and movements in cash that Council may hold as a result of holding trust deposits. The values may differ from those shown in the Comprehensive Income Statement as it is prepared on an accrual accounting basis and the Cash Flow Statement is based on the timing of cash receipts and payments.

Council's cash arises from, and is used in, three main areas:

Cash flows from operating activities

All cash received into Council's bank account from ratepayers and others who owed money to Council.

- Receipts include the interest earnings from Council's cash investments and movement in trust deposits taken. It does not include the costs associated with the sale of assets.
- Payments include all cash paid by Council from its bank account to staff, creditors and other persons. Also includes the movement in trust monies repaid. It does not include the costs associated with the creation of assets.

Cash flows from investing activities

Cash flows from investing activities show the cash invested in the creation or purchase of property, infrastructure, plant and equipment assets, the cash received from the sale of these assets or property held for resale and proceeds from investments.

Cash flows from financing activities

Cash flows from financing activities includes proceeds from borrowing, the repayment of loans and lease liabilities.

During the 2024-25 financial year Council repaid \$3.93 million of its long-term debt.

The bottom line of the Statement of Cash Flows represents cash at the end of the financial year. This cash, combined with the cash invested and classified as 'other financial assets', shows the capacity of Council to meet its cash debts and other liabilities. This overall cash balance is allocated for specific future purposes by Council to cover several items including employee provisions, unearned income, reserves and carry forward budgets to 2025-26. For further details, refer to Note 5.1 of the Financial Report.

Glossary of Financial Terms

- · Surplus: When income exceeds expenses.
- Depreciation: Reduction in value of assets over time due to use or aging.
- Asset Revaluation: Adjustment of asset values to reflect current market or replacement costs.
- Capital Grants: Funds received for specific infrastructure projects.
- *Unearned Income:* Income received for services not yet delivered.

Note: – The above financial report summary does not form part of statutory reporting and hence is not subject to audit certification. It has been written to assist the Greater Dandenong community in better understanding the financial operations and financial position of their Council. Commentary must be read in conjunction with the Financial Report.

Notes to the Consolidated Financial Report

Note 1 Overview

The Greater Dandenong City Council was established in December 1994 with the amalgamation of the former City of Springvale and former City of Dandenong, and is a body corporate. The Council's main office is located at 225 Lonsdale Street, Dandenong, 3175.

Statement of compliance

These consolidated financial statements are a general purpose financial report that consists of a Comprehensive Income Statement, Balance Sheet, Statement of Changes in Equity, Statement of Cash Flows, Statement of Capital Works and notes accompanying these financial statements. The general purpose financial report complies with Australian Accounting Standards (AAS), other authoritative pronouncements of the Australian Accounting Standards Board, the Local Government Act 2020, and the Local Government (Planning and Reporting) Regulations 2020.

The Council is a not-for-profit entity and therefore applies the additional AUS paragraphs applicable to a not-for-profit entity under the Australian Accounting Standards.

Accounting policy information

1.1 Basis of accounting

These consolidated financial statements for the year ended 30 June 2025 comprise the results of operations for both Council and its wholly owned subsidiaries, namely the Dandenong Market Pty Ltd and South East Leisure Pty Ltd. Refer to Note 6.3 for further details of Council's subsidiaries.

Accounting policies are selected and applied in a manner which ensures that the resulting financial information satisfies the concepts of relevance and reliability, thereby ensuring that the substance of the underlying transactions or other events is reported. Specific accounting policies applied are disclosed in sections where the related balance or financial statement matter is disclosed.

The accrual basis of accounting has been used in the preparation of these financial statements, whereby assets, liabilities, equity, income and expenses are recognised in the reporting period to which they relate, regardless of when cash is received or paid.

The financial statements are based on the historical cost convention unless a different measurement basis is specifically disclosed in the notes to the financial statements.

Judgements, estimates and assumptions are required to be made about the carrying values of assets and liabilities that are not readily apparent from other sources. The estimates and associated judgements are based on professional judgement derived from historical experience and various other factors that are believed to be reasonable under the circumstances. Actual results may differ from these estimates.

The financial statements have been prepared on a going concern basis. The financial statements are in Australian dollars. The amounts presented in the financial statements have been rounded to the nearest thousand dollars unless otherwise specified. Minor discrepancies in tables between totals and the sum of components are due to rounding.

Revisions to accounting estimates are recognised in the period in which the estimate is revised and also in future periods that are affected by the revision. Judgements and assumptions made by management in the application of AAS's that have significant effects on the financial statements and estimates relate to:

- the fair value of land, buildings and infrastructure (refer to note 6.2 and 8.4).
- the determination of depreciation for buildings, infrastructure, plant and equipment (refer to note 6.2).
- the determination of employee provisions (refer to note 5.5(a)).
- the determination of landfill provisions (refer to note 5.5(b)).
- the determination of whether performance obligations are sufficiently specific so as to determine whether an arrangement is within the scope of AASB 15 Revenue from Contracts with Customers or AASB 1058 Income of Not-for-Profit Entities (refer to note 3).
- the determination, in accordance with AASB 16 Leases, of the lease term, the estimation of the discount rate when not implicit in the lease and whether an arrangement is in substance shortterm or low value (refer to note 5.8).
- other areas requiring judgements.

Unless otherwise stated, all accounting policies are consistent with those applied in the prior year. Where appropriate, comparative figures have been amended to accord with current presentation. Disclosure has been made of any material changes to comparatives (refer to note 10). It is noted that there have been no material changes to comparatives.

Note 1 Overview (continued)

Goods and Services Tax (GST)

Income and expenses are recognised net of the amount of associated GST. Receivables and payables are stated inclusive of the amount of GST receivable or payable. The net amount of GST recoverable from, or payable to, the taxation authority is included with other receivables or payables in the balance sheet.

1.2 Impact of emergencies and natural disasters

During 2024-25 there were no notable emergencies or natural disasters that impacted Council's operations.

Note 2 Analysis of our results

2.1 Performance against budget

The budget comparison notes compare Council's financial plan, expressed through its annual budget, with actual performance. The *Local Government* (*Planning and Reporting*) *Regulations 2020* requires explanation of any material variances. Council has adopted a materiality threshold of greater than 10 per cent and greater than \$1 million or where further explanation is warranted. Explanations have not been provided for variations below the materiality threshold unless the variance is considered to be material because of its nature.

The budget figures detailed below are those adopted by Council on 24 June 2024 (known as the Adopted Budget). The Budget was based on assumptions that were relevant at the time of adoption of the Budget. Council sets guidelines and parameters for income and expense targets in this budget in order to meet Council's planning and financial performance targets for both the short and long-term. The budget did not reflect any changes to equity resulting from asset revaluations, as their impacts were not considered predictable.

These notes are prepared to meet the requirements of the Local Government Act 2020 and the Local Government (Planning and Reporting)
Regulations 2020.

2.2 Analysis of Council results by program

2.2.1 Council delivers its functions and activities through the following programs.

Chief Executive Office (CEO)

The Chief Executive Office includes the CEO, Digital Technology and Strategic Growth and Advocacy functions.

The Chief Executive Office has overall responsibility for the operations of the organisation. Each member of the executive team reports to the CEO.

The Digital Technology unit is responsible for the provision of cost-effective information and telecommunication solutions to staff and councillors.

Strategic Growth and Advocacy is responsible for Council's organisational strategy and performance; asset management; and advocacy functions. The business units within this department include Asset Management, Community Advocacy, and Corporate Planning and Performance.

City Futures

City Futures is responsible for a large range of Council activities including parks and waste, roads and transport, major projects, sustainability, statutory planning, growth and investment, place making and revitalisation. It has a key focus on the development of our built and natural environments and ensuring that Council's activities match the community's future needs for facilities, housing, and sustainability.

The departments which make up City Futures are Business Development and Investment, Chief Engineer and Major Projects, Infrastructure Services, Statutory Planning, Strategic and Environmental Planning, and Transport and Civil Development.

Community Strengthening

Community Strengthening provides direct services to the community across a wide range of programs such as sport and recreation, libraries, youth and families, children's services, festivals and events, support for older people and community safety. This directorate manages Community Amenity, Creative and Engaged City; Community Care; Community Wellbeing; and Safe, Active and Connected Communities.

Corporate Development

Corporate Development covers a broad range of organisational functions including financial planning, communications, customer experience, governance, risk management and organisational development. The departments within this directorate include Financial Services; Governance, Legal and Risk; Communications and Customer Experience; and People and Change.

Non-attributable

The items that cannot be reliably attributable to a directorate. For example furniture, fixtures and fittings that cannot be identified by a location or work in progress that cannot be easily allocated to a directorate.

Grant revenue with sufficiently specific performance obligations is recognised over time as the performance obligations specified in the underlying agreement are met. Where performance obligations are not sufficiently specific, grants are recognised on the earlier of receipt or when an unconditional right to receipt has been established. Grants relating to capital projects are generally recognised progressively as the capital project is completed. The former landfill is located between Clarke Road and Springvale Road and the premises was used as a landfill for disposal of waste from 1993 to 1999 under a licence issued by the Environmental Protection Authority (EPA). The landfill is owned by the Greater Dandenong City Council and is used as recreational open space. Under the terms of a licence agreement with the Environment Protection Authority (EPA) and Pollution Abatement notices, Council is required to monitor, progressively rehabilitate and conduct rectification works.

Council reviews the landfill restoration provision on an annual basis, including the key assumptions listed below.

The Greater Dandenong City Council shares the commitment for rehabilitation and aftercare management of the landfill with other stakeholder Council's. Council's interest or share of the costs is 19.88%. In the financial report for 30 June 2025, Council has an amount of \$1.46 million (30 June 2024 \$1.10 million) as a provision for the restoration of the Springvalley Road landfill site which includes aftercare costs to meet EPA obligations.

5.8 Leases

At inception of a contract, Council assesses whether a contract is, or contains, a lease. A contract is, or contains, a lease if the contract conveys the right to control the use of an identified asset for a period of time in exchange for consideration. To identify whether a contract conveys the right to control the use of an identified asset, it is necessary to assess whether:

- The contract involves the use of an identified asset;
- Council has the right to obtain substantially all of the economic benefits from use of the asset throughout the period of use; and
- Council has the right to direct the use of the asset.

This policy is applied to contracts entered into, or changed, on or after 1 July 2019.

As a lessee, Council recognises a right-of-use asset and a lease liability at the lease commencement date. The right-of-use asset is initially measured at cost which comprises the initial amount of the lease liability adjusted for:

- any lease payments made at or before the commencement date less any lease incentives received; plus
- any initial direct costs incurred; and
- an estimate of costs to dismantle and remove the underlying asset or to restore the underlying asset or the site on which it is located.

The right-of-use asset is subsequently depreciated using the straight-line method from the commencement date to the earlier of the end of the useful life of the right-of-use asset or the end of the lease term. The estimated useful lives of right-of-use assets are determined on the same basis as those of property, plant and equipment. In addition, the right-of-use asset is periodically reduced by impairment losses, if any, and adjusted for certain measurements of the lease liability.

The lease liability is initially measured at the present value of the lease payments that are not paid at the commencement date, discounted using the interest rate implicit in the lease or, if that rate cannot be readily determined, an appropriate incremental borrowing rate. Generally, Council uses an appropriate incremental borrowing rate as the discount rate.

Lease payments included in the measurement of the lease liability comprise the following:

- Fixed payments
- Variable lease payments that depend on an index or a rate, initially measured using the index or rate as at the commencement date;
- Amounts expected to be payable under a residual value guarantee; and
- The exercise price under a purchase option that Council is reasonably certain to exercise, lease payments in an optional renewal period if Council is reasonably certain to exercise an extension option, and penalties for early termination of a lease unless Council is reasonably certain not to terminate early.

When the lease liability is remeasured in this way, a corresponding adjustment is made to the carrying amount of the right-of-use asset, or is recorded in profit or loss if the carrying amount of the right-of-use asset has been reduced to zero.

Under AASB 16 Leases, Council as a not-for-profit entity has elected not to measure right-of-use assets at initial recognition at fair value in respect of leases that have significantly below-market terms.

(f) Recognition

Acquisition

The purchase method of accounting is used for all acquisitions of assets, being the fair value of assets provided as consideration at the date of acquisition plus any incidental costs attributable to the acquisition. Fair value is the price that would be received to sell an asset (or paid to transfer a liability) in an orderly transaction between market participants at the measurement date. Refer also to Note 8.4 for further disclosure regarding fair value measurement.

Where assets are constructed by Council, cost includes all materials used in construction, direct labour, borrowing costs incurred during construction and an appropriate share of directly attributable variable and fixed overheads.

In accordance with Council's policy, the threshold limits detailed in note 6.2(g) have been applied when recognising assets within an applicable asset class and unless otherwise stated are consistent with the prior year.

Land under roads

Council recognises all land under roads acquired after 30 June 2008 at fair value. Council does not recognise land under roads that it controlled prior to that period in its financial report.

Repairs and maintenance

Where the repair relates to the replacement of a component of an asset and the cost exceeds the capitalisation threshold, the cost is capitalised and depreciated. The carrying value of the replaced asset is expensed.

Leasehold improvements

Leasehold improvements are recognised at cost and are amortised over the unexpired period of the lease or the estimated useful life of the improvement, whichever is the shorter. At balance date, leasehold improvements are amortised over a 5 to 30 year period.

(g) Depreciation

All asset classes except land, land under roads and art works, having limited useful lives are systematically depreciated over their useful lives to the Council in a manner which reflects consumption of the service potential embodied in those assets. Estimates of remaining useful lives are made on a regular basis with major asset classes reassessed annually. Depreciation rates and methods are reviewed annually.

Where assets have separate identifiable components that are subject to regular replacement, these components are assigned distinct useful lives and residual values and a separate depreciation rate is determined for each component.

Straight line depreciation is charged based on the residual useful life as determined each year.

Asset recognition thresholds and depreciation periods

Depreciation periods used are listed below and are consistent with the prior year unless marked with an *.

Council has also set a threshold limit for all classes of assets, which means that all assets with a value equal or greater than this threshold are recognised in these financial statements.

The last formal valuation of land and buildings at 1 January 2024 was undertaken by qualified independent valuers, Patel Dore Valuers Pty Ltd. The valuation of land and buildings is at fair value, being market value based on highest and best use permitted by relevant land planning provisions. Where land use is restricted through existing planning provisions the valuation is reduced to reflect this limitation. This adjustment is an unobservable input in the valuation. Specialised land is valued at fair value using site values adjusted for englobo (undeveloped and/or unserviced) characteristics, access rights and private interests of other parties and entitlements of infrastructure assets and services. During 2024-25, Council adopted ARC360, an online asset valuation platform developed by Insight Valuations, to enhance the accuracy and transparency of infrastructure asset replacement rates. The transition from spreadsheet-based models to ARC360 enabled more granular assessments incorporating asset-specific features, location, and updated construction inputs, which along with input cost increases, resulted in significant revaluation increases across Roads, Footpaths and Cycleways, Off-street Car Parks and Drainage. These increases also reflect the application of AASB 13 amendments, including site preparation and disruption costs, which contributed \$40.4 million to the overall revaluation increment. Valuations were undertaken by Ashay Prabhu, MIE(Aust), CPEng, NPER (Membership 1102199), a qualified valuer with over 25 years' experience in infrastructure asset valuation.

As part of this process, Council also incorporated recent amendments to AASB 13, which require the inclusion of overheads related to site preparation and disruption. These overheads are estimated to account for approximately 10-11% of the total infrastructure asset revaluation increase of \$372.8 million in 2024-25. The remaining infrastructure asset classes are scheduled for a similar review in the 2025-26 financial year.

Description of significant unobservable inputs into level 3 valuations

Specialised land and land under roads are valued using a market based direct comparison technique. Significant unobservable inputs include the extent and impact of restrictions of use and the market cost of land per square metre. The extent and impact of restrictions on use varies and results in a reduction to surrounding land values between 5% and 98%. Where there is an assessed advantage (such as location, frontage, access and zoning), land values have been increased by 3% to 55%. The market value of land varies significantly depending on the location of the land and the current market conditions. Currently, land values range between \$2 and \$7,250 per square metre.

Specialised buildings are valued using a current replacement cost technique. Significant unobservable inputs include the current replacement cost and remaining useful lives of buildings. Current replacement costs are calculated on a square metre basis and range from \$340 to \$66,000 per square metre. The remaining useful lives of specialised buildings are determined on the basis of the current condition of buildings and vary from 1 year to 100 years. Replacement cost is sensitive to changes in market conditions, with any increase or decrease in cost flowing through to the valuation. Useful lives of buildings are sensitive to changes in expectations or requirements that could either shorten or extend the useful lives of buildings.

Infrastructure assets are valued based on the current replacement cost. Significant unobservable inputs include the current replacement cost and remaining useful lives of infrastructure. The remaining useful lives of infrastructure assets are determined on the basis of the current condition of the asset and vary from 1 year to 100 years. Replacement cost is sensitive to changes in market conditions, with any increase or decrease in cost flowing through to the valuation. Useful lives of infrastructure are sensitive to changes in use, expectations or requirements that could either shorten or extend the useful lives of infrastructure assets.

6.3 Investments in associates, joint arrangements and subsidiaries

a) Principles of consolidation

The consolidated financial statements of Council incorporate all entities controlled by Council as at 30 June 2025, and their income and expenses for that part of the reporting period in which control existed. Subsidiaries are all entities over which Council has control. Council controls an entity when it is exposed to, or has rights to, variable returns from its involvement with the entity and has the ability to affect those returns through its power to direct the activities of the entity. Subsidiaries are fully consolidated from the date on which control is transferred to the Council. They are deconsolidated from the date that control ceases.

Where dissimilar accounting policies are adopted by entities and their effect is considered material, adjustments are made to ensure consistent policies are adopted in these financial statements.

Entities consolidated into Council are Dandenong Market Pty Ltd and South East Leisure Pty Ltd.

Reconciliation of Council, it's subsidiaries and consolidated accounts

Dandenong Market Pty Ltd

Dandenong Market Pty Ltd (DMPL) is a wholly owned subsidiary company of the Greater Dandenong City Council, established in 2012. DMPL is managed in accordance with the terms set out in a Management Service Agreement which was updated and approved by Council on the 25 August 2021. This Agreement took effect from 1 July 2021 and continues until 30 June 2026. The Management Service Agreement

runs concurrently with the Lease Agreement (50 years) and provides for annual agreement extensions at Council's discretion.

In recent years, the broader economic environment has presented ongoing challenges, with rising interest rates and cost-of-living pressures contributing to a decline in business confidence. These conditions have placed sustained pressure on DMPL's revenue streams, while operational costs have continued to rise.

Despite these headwinds, DMPL delivered a stronger than forecast financial return in 2024-25, reflecting prudent management and resilience in a difficult market. Looking ahead, a return is also budgeted for 2025–26, and DMPL remains focused on adapting to economic conditions while continuing to deliver value to Council and the community.

South East Leisure Pty Ltd

South East Leisure Pty Ltd (SEL) is another wholly owned subsidiary company of the Greater Dandenong City Council, established in 2021 and commenced operations from 1 July 2022. SEL manages and operates four leisure centres on the terms set out in a Management Services Agreement dated September 2021 from 1 July 2022 through to 30 June 2032:

- · Dandenong Oasis
- Noble Park Aquatic Centre (NPAC)
- · Springers Leisure Centre
- · Dandenong Stadium.

Council also granted a lease to SEL in respect of each of the four major leisure facilities which runs concurrently with the Management Services Agreement for the next 10 years.

Note 8 Managing uncertainties

8.1 Contingent assets and liabilities

Contingent assets and contingent liabilities are not recognised in the Balance Sheet, but are disclosed by way of a note and, if quantifiable, are measured at nominal value. Contingent assets and liabilities are presented inclusive of GST receivable or payable respectively.

(a) Contingent assets

Contingent assets are possible assets that arise from past events, whose existence will be confirmed only by the occurrence or non-occurrence of one or more uncertain future events not wholly within the control of the Council.

The following are potential contingent assets to be considered by Council.

Developer contributions

Greater Dandenong acquires infrastructure assets, such as local roads, footpaths, kerb and channel and drains etc, from developers, as subdivisional contributions. The amount and value of assets acquired depends on the size of the development and the level of growth within the municipality. Developers construct infrastructure assets which are vested with Council when Council issues a Statement of Compliance. These assets are brought to account as revenue (Contributions - Non-Monetary) and capitalised. At reporting date, developers had commenced construction of assets that will eventually be transferred to the Council subject to Council issuing a Statement of Compliance. Council cannot reliably measure the value of the assets involved prior to completion and the timing of recognition.

(b) Contingent liabilities

Contingent liabilities are:

- possible obligations that arise from past events, whose existence will be confirmed only by the occurrence or non-occurrence of one or more uncertain future events not wholly within the control of the Council; or
- present obligations that arise from past events but are not recognised because:
- it is not probable that an outflow of resources embodying economic benefits will be required to settle the obligation; or
- the amount of the obligation cannot be measured with sufficient reliability.

Superannuation

Council has obligations under a defined benefit superannuation scheme that may result in the need to make additional contributions to the scheme, matters relating to this potential obligation are outlined in Note 9.3. As a result of the volatility in financial markets the likelihood of making such contributions in future periods exists

Development Contribution Plans (DCP)

Council has three sites that are subject to formal development contribution plans, two are in Keysborough and one in Lyndhurst. All three sites are covered by a DCP.

A DCP provides the framework for the provision and funding of infrastructure to facilitate the set development area and the purpose of a DCP is to provide a "fair distribution of costs for works and services, including roads, traffic management and community facilities to all the proper servicing in the area".

New development in each of the areas is required to meet its share of the total cost of delivering the required infrastructure works – as measured by its projected share of usage – through development contributions collected under the DCP's. The balance of works not covered by development contributions has been agreed to be funded by Council. The total value of these works is estimated to be around \$10 million.

Landfills

The Greater Dandenong City Council may be liable for the consequences of disposing refuse at a number of legacy landfill sites. A legacy site refers to a landfill that has been decommissioned and is no longer receiving waste. At balance date Council is unable to assess whether there are any financial implications.

Legal actions

Council is presently involved in a number of confidential legal matters, which are being conducted through Council's solicitors. The estimated potential financial effect of these matters may be up to \$2.15 million (\$1.0 million as at 30 June 2024).

MAV Workcare

Council was a participant of the MAV WorkCare Scheme. The MAV WorkCare Scheme provided workers compensation insurance. MAV WorkCare commenced business on 1 November 2017 and the last day the Scheme operated as a self-insurer was 30 June 2021. In accordance with the *Workplace Injury Rehabilitation and Compensation Act 2013*, there is a six year liability period following the cessation of the Scheme (to 30 June 2027). During the liability period, adjustment payments may be required. Since 30 June 2021, Council has paid \$1.39 million in adjustment

payments (2024-25: \$29,327 and 2023-24: \$32,260). The determination of any adjustment payments is dependent upon revised actuarial assessments of the Scheme's tail claims liabilities as undertaken by Work Safe Victoria. If required, adjustments will occur at the 3-year and 6-year points during the liability period, and will affect participating members. The 30 June 2024 marks the three-year anniversary of the schemes cessation. In August 2025, Council received an invoice for an additional adjustment payment of \$447,000 which will be paid in 2025-26.

8.1 (c) Guarantees for loans to other entities

The amount disclosed for financial guarantee in this note is the nominal amount of the underlying loan that is guaranteed by the Council, not the fair value of the financial guarantee.

Financial guarantee contracts are not recognised as a liability in the Balance Sheet unless the lender has exercised their right to call on the guarantee or Council has other reasons to believe that it is probable that right will be exercised. Details of guarantees that Council has provided, that are not recognised in the Balance Sheet are disclosed below.

8.2 Change in accounting standards

Certain new Australian Accounting Standards and interpretations have been published that are not mandatory for the 30 June 2025 reporting period. Council assesses the impact of these new standards. As at 30 June 2025 there were no new accounting standards or interpretations issued by the AASB which are applicable for the year ending 30 June 2025 that are expected to impact Council.

In September 2024 the Australian Accounting Standards Board (AASB) issued two Australian Sustainability Reporting Standards (ASRS). This followed Commonwealth legislation establishing Australia's sustainability reporting framework. Relevant entities will be required to undertake mandatory reporting of climate-related disclosures in future financial years. Public sector application issues remain under consideration and Council will continue to monitor developments and potential implications for future financial years.

8.3 Financial instruments

(a) Objectives and policies

The Council's principal financial instruments comprise cash assets, term deposits, receivables (excluding statutory receivables), payables (excluding statutory payables) and bank borrowings. Details of the significant accounting policies and methods adopted, including the criteria for recognition, the basis of measurement and the basis on which income and expenses are recognised, in respect of each class of financial asset, financial liability and equity instrument is disclosed in notes of the financial statements. Risk management is carried out by senior management

under policies approved by the Council. These policies include identification and analysis of the risk exposure to Council and appropriate procedures, controls and risk minimisation.

(b) Market risk

Market risk is the risk that the fair value or future cash flows of our financial instruments will fluctuate because of changes in market prices. The Council's exposures to market risk is primarily through interest rate risk with only insignificant exposure to other price risks and no exposure to foreign currency risk.

Interest rate risk

Interest rate risk refers to the risk that the value of a financial instrument or cash flows associated with the instrument will fluctuate due to changes in market interest rates. Interest rate risk arises primarily from long term loans and borrowings at fixed rates which exposes us to fair value interest rate risk. We do not hold any interest bearing financial instruments that are measured at fair value, and therefore has no exposure to fair value interest rate risk. Cash flow interest rate risk is the risk that the future cash flows of a financial instrument will fluctuate because of changes in market interest rates. Council has minimal exposure to cash flow interest rate risk through its cash and deposits that are at floating rates.

Investment of surplus funds is made with approved financial institutions under the *Local Government Act 2020*. We manage interest rate risk by adopting an investment policy that ensures:

- diversification of investment product
- monitoring of return on investment and
- benchmarking of returns and comparison with budget.

There has been no significant change in the Council's exposure, or its objectives, policies and processes for managing interest rate risk or the methods used to measure this risk from the previous reporting period.

Interest rate movements have not been sufficiently significant during the year to have an impact on the Council's year end result.

(c) Credit risk

Credit risk is the risk that a contracting entity will not complete its obligations under a financial instrument and cause us to make a financial loss. We have exposure to credit risk on some financial assets included in the Balance Sheet. Particularly significant area of credit risk exists in relation to outstanding fees and fines as well as loans and receivables from sporting clubs and associations. To help manage this risk:

- we have a policy for establishing credit limits for the entities we deal with
- we may require collateral where appropriate and
- we only invest surplus funds with financial institutions which have a recognised credit rating specified in our investment policy.

Receivables consist of a large number of customers, spread across the ratepayer, business and government sectors. Credit risk associated with the Council's financial assets is minimal. Rates debtors are secured by a charge over the rateable property. Council has assessed that 16% of parking infringement debts owing to Council are unlikely to be collected and has raised a provision for doubtful debts over those debts based on an assessment of collectability. The collection of long overdue parking infringement debts is managed by Fines Victoria.

Refer note 5.1 for financial assets which are determined to be impaired.

Council may also be subject to credit risk for transactions which are not included in the Balance Sheet, such as when Council provides a guarantee for another party. Details of Council's contingent liabilities are disclosed in note 8.1(b).

The maximum exposure to credit risk at the reporting date to recognised financial assets is the carrying amount, net of any allowance for impairment of those assets, as disclosed in the balance sheet and notes to the financial statements. Council does not hold any collateral.

(d) Liquidity risk

Liquidity risk includes the risk that, as a result of our operational liquidity requirements we will not have sufficient funds to settle a transaction when required or will be forced to sell a financial asset at below value or may be unable to settle or recover a financial asset.

To help reduce these risks Council:

- has a liquidity policy which targets a minimum and average level of cash and cash equivalents to be maintained.
- has readily accessible standby facilities and other funding arrangements in place.
- has a liquidity portfolio structure that requires surplus funds to be invested within various bands of liquid instruments.
- monitors budget to actual performance on a regular basis, and
- sets limits on borrowings relating to the percentage of loans to rate revenue and percentage of loan principal repayments to rate revenue.

The Council's maximum exposure to liquidity risk is the carrying amounts of financial liabilities as disclosed in the face of the Balance Sheet and the amounts related to financial guarantees disclosed in note 8.1(c), and is deemed insignificant based on prior periods' data and current assessment of risk.

There has been no significant change in Council's exposure, or its objectives, policies and processes for managing liquidity risk or the methods used to measure this risk from the previous reporting period.

With the exception of borrowings, all financial liabilities are expected to be settled within normal terms of trade. Details of the maturity profile for borrowings are disclosed at note 5.4.

Unless otherwise stated, the carrying amount of financial instruments reflect their fair value.

(e) Sensitivity disclosure analysis

Taking into account past performance, future expectations, economic forecasts, and management's knowledge and experience of the financial markets, Council believes the following movements are 'reasonably possible' over the next 12 months:

 A parallel shift of +1% and - 1% in market interest rates (AUD) from year-end rates of 4.57%.

These movements will not have a material impact on the valuation of Council's financial assets and liabilities, nor will they have a material impact on the results of Council's operations.

8 4 Fair value measurement

Fair value hierarchy

Council's financial assets and liabilities are not valued in accordance with the fair value hierarchy, Council's financial assets and liabilities are measured at amortised cost.

Council measures certain assets and liabilities at fair value where required or permitted by Australian Accounting Standards. *AASB 13 'Fair value measurement'*, aims to improve consistency and reduce complexity by providing a definition of fair value and a single source of fair value measurement and disclosure requirements for use across Australian Accounting Standards.

Council has considered the amendments to AASB 13 Fair Value Measurement that apply for the 2024-25 financial year as a result of AASB 2022-10 Amendments to Australian Accounting Standards – Fair Value Measurement of Non-Financial Assets of Not-for-Profit Public Sector Entities. For assets, where the Council adopts a current replacement cost approach to determine fair value, the Council now considers the inclusion of site preparation costs, disruption costs and costs to restore another entity's assets in the underlying valuation.

The AASB 13 amendments apply prospectively, comparative figures have not been restated.

The AASB 13 amendments have impacted Council's financial statements as follows: The current replacement cost of Council assets, such as infrastructure assets, has increased by \$40.4 million due to the inclusion of site preparation costs, disruption costs and costs to restore another entity's assets.

All assets and liabilities for which fair value is measured or disclosed in the financial statements are categorised within a fair value hierarchy, described as follows, based on the lowest level input that is significant to the fair value measurement as a whole:

Level 1 – Quoted (unadjusted) market prices in active markets for identical assets or liabilities.

Level 2 – Valuation techniques for which the lowest level input that is significant to the fair value measurement is directly or indirectly observable

Level 3 – Valuation techniques for which the lowest level input that is significant to the fair value measurement is unobservable

For the purpose of fair value disclosures, Council has determined classes of assets and liabilities on the basis of the nature, characteristics and risks of the asset or liability and the level of the fair value hierarchy as explained above.

In addition, Council determines whether transfers have occurred between levels in the hierarchy by reassessing categorisation (based on the lowest level input that is significant to the fair value measurement as a whole) at the end of each reporting period.

Revaluation

Subsequent to the initial recognition of assets, non-current physical assets, other than plant and equipment, works in progress and leasehold improvements are measured at their fair value, being the price that would be received to sell an asset (or paid to transfer a liability) in an orderly transaction between market participants at the measurement date. For assets valued at cost, the carrying amount is considered to approximate fair value given short useful lives. At balance date, the Council reviewed the carrying value of the individual classes of assets measured at fair value to ensure that each asset materially approximated its fair value. Where the carrying value materially differed from the fair value at balance date, the class of asset was revalued.

Fair value valuations are determined in accordance with a valuation hierarchy. Changes to the valuation hierarchy will only occur if an external change in the restrictions or limitations of use of an asset result in changes to the permissible or practical highest and best use of the asset. In addition, Council undertakes a formal revaluation of land, buildings, and infrastructure assets on a regular basis ranging from 1 to 5 years. The valuation is performed either by experienced council officers or independent experts. The following table sets out the frequency of revaluations by asset class.

Where the assets are revalued, the revaluation increases are credited directly to the asset revaluation reserve except to the extent that an increase reverses a prior year decrease for that class of asset that had been recognised as an expense in which case the increase is recognised as revenue up to the amount of the expense. Revaluation decreases are recognised as an expense except where prior increases are included in the asset revaluation reserve for that class of asset in which case the decrease is taken to the reserve to the extent of the remaining increases. Within the same class of assets, revaluation increases and decreases within the year are offset. Impairment of assets.

Impairment of assets

At each reporting date, the Council reviews the carrying value of its assets to determine whether there is any indication that these assets have been impaired. If such an indication exists, the recoverable amount of the asset, being the higher of the asset's fair value less costs of disposal and value in use, is compared to the asset's carrying value. Any excess of the asset's carrying value over its recoverable amount is expensed to the Comprehensive Income Statement, unless the asset is carried at the revalued amount in which case, the impairment loss is recognised directly against the revaluation surplus in respect of the same class of asset to the extent that the impairment loss does not exceed the amount in the revaluation surplus for that same class of asset.

At each reporting date, the Council reviews the carrying value of its assets to determine whether there is any indication that these assets have been impaired. If such an indication exists, the recoverable amount of the asset, being the higher of the asset's fair value less costs of disposal and value in use, is compared to the asset's carrying value. Any excess of the asset's carrying value over its recoverable amount is expensed to the Comprehensive Income Statement, unless the asset is carried at the revalued amount in which case, the impairment loss is recognised directly against the revaluation surplus in respect of the same class of asset to the extent that the impairment loss does not exceed the amount in the revaluation surplus for that same class of asset.

Nature and purpose of other reserves:

Insurance reserve

The insurance reserve has been created to meet large and unexpected policy excesses on multiple insurance claims.

Re-vegetation reserves

The purpose of this reserve fund is to meet native revegetation requirements on Council's reserves.

<u>Open space – planning, development</u> <u>and improvements</u>

Funds set aside in this reserve will be utilised exclusively for allocation towards enhancing the City's open space via planning, development and improvements.

Open space - acquisitions

Funds set aside in this reserve will be utilised exclusively for open space land acquisitions.

Keysborough South maintenance levy

This reserve has been established to ensure full accountability of the levies received for the Keysborough and Somerfield Estates reflecting costs of maintaining an additional 15% open space beyond that of traditional estates.

Major projects reserve

The major projects reserve holds proceeds from the sale of Council's property assets or surplus Council funds and will be utilised for investing in other properties or funding future major projects.

General reserve

This reserve relates to financial impacts of future aged care sector reforms and fixed term contracts in community service programs.

Council funded development contributions reserve

The reserve for Council funded development contribution plans holds funds in respect of Council's contribution to the two major developments in Dandenong South (C87) and Keysborough (C36).

Spring Valley landfill rehabilitation reserve

The purpose of this reserve is to rehabilitate the Spring Valley landfill site at Clarke Road, Springvale South.

<u>Springvale Activity Precinct – parking and</u> development reserve

The purpose of the reserve is to fund development in the Springvale Activity Centre.

<u>Dandenong Activity Precinct – parking and development reserve</u>

The purpose of the reserve is to fund development in the Dandenong Activity Centre.

Future maintenance reserve

This reserve holds contribution funds for future works to address level crossing removal authority defects.

Digital Technology reserve

This reserve is dedicated to advancing Council's digital capabilities. This reserve supports initiatives that drive innovation, improve operational efficiency, enhance customer and employee experiences, and ensure long-term technological resilience.

9.3 Superannuation

Council makes the majority of its employer superannuation contributions in respect of its employees to the Local Authorities Superannuation Fund (the Fund). This Fund has two categories of membership, accumulation and defined benefit, each of which is funded differently.

Obligations for contributions to the Fund are recognised as an expense in Comprehensive Income Statement when they are made or due.

Accumulation

The Fund's accumulation category, Vision MySuper/Vision Super Saver, receives both employer and employee contributions on a progressive basis. Employer contributions are normally based on a fixed percentage of employee earnings (for the year ended 30 June 2025, this was 11.5% as required under Superannuation Guarantee (SG) legislation (2024:11.0%)).

Defined Benefit

Council does not use defined benefit accounting for its defined benefit obligations under the Fund's Defined Benefit category. This is because the Fund's Defined Benefit category is a pooled multi-employer sponsored plan.

There is no proportional split of the defined benefit liabilities, assets or costs between the participating employers as the defined benefit obligation is a floating obligation between the participating employers and the only time that the aggregate obligation is allocated to specific employers is when a call is made. As a result, the level of participation of Council in the Fund cannot be measured as a percentage compared with other participating employers. Therefore, the Fund Actuary is unable to allocate benefit liabilities, assets and costs between employers for the purposes of AASB 119.

Funding arrangements

Council makes employer contributions to the Defined Benefit category of the Fund at rates determined by the Trustee on the advice of the Fund Actuary. As at 30 June 2024, an interim actuarial investigation was held as the Fund provides lifetime pensions in the Defined Benefit category. The vested benefit index (VBI) of the Defined Benefit category as at 30 June 2024 (of which Council is a contributing employer) was 105.4%. The financial assumptions used to calculate the VBI were:

5.60% pa
3.50% pa
2.70% pa

As at 30 June 2025, an interim actuarial investigation is underway as the Fund provides lifetime pensions in the Defined Benefit category. It is expected to be completed by 31 October 2025.

Vision Super has advised that the VBI at 30 June 2025 was 110.5%. Council was notified of the 30 June 2025 VBI during August 2025 (2024: August 2024). The financial assumptions used to calculate this VBI were:

Salary information

2.60% pa

The VBI is used as the primary funding indicator. Because the VBI was above 100%, the 30 June 2024 actuarial investigation determined the Defined Benefit category was in a satisfactory financial position and that no change was necessary to the Defined Benefit category's funding arrangements from prior years. Employer contributions

(a) Regular contributions

On the basis of the results of the 2024 interim actuarial investigation conducted by the Fund Actuary, Council makes employer contributions to the Fund's Defined Benefit category at rates determined by the Fund's Trustee. For the year ended 30 June 2025, this rate was 11.5% of members' salaries (11.0% in 2023-24). This rate is expected to increase in line with any increases in the SG contribution rate and was reviewed as part of the 30 June 2023 triennial valuation.

In addition, Council reimburses the Fund to cover the excess of the benefits paid as a consequence of retrenchment above the funded resignation or retirement benefit.

(b) Funding calls

If the Defined Benefit category is in an unsatisfactory financial position at an actuarial investigation or the Defined Benefit category's VBI is below its shortfall limit at any time other than the date of the actuarial investigation, the Defined Benefit category has a shortfall for the purposes of SPS 160 and the Fund is required to put a plan in place so that the shortfall is fully funded within three years of the shortfall occurring. The Fund monitors its VBI on a quarterly basis and the Fund has set its shortfall limit at 98% from 26 July 2024 (previously 97%).

In the event that the Fund Actuary determines that there is a shortfall based on the above requirement, the Fund's participating employers (including Council) are required to make an employer contribution to cover the shortfall.

Using the agreed methodology, the shortfall amount is apportioned between the participating employers based on the pre-1 July 1993 and post-30 June 1993 service liabilities of the Fund's Defined Benefit category, together with the employer's payroll at 30 June 1993 and at the date the shortfall has been calculated.

9.3 Superannuation (continued)

Due to the nature of the contractual obligations between the participating employers and the Fund, and that the Fund includes lifetime pensioners and their reversionary beneficiaries, it is unlikely that the Fund will be wound up.

If there is a surplus in the Fund, the surplus cannot be returned to the participating employers.

In the event that a participating employer is wound-up, the defined benefit obligations of that employer will be transferred to that employer's successor.

The 2024 interim actuarial investigation surplus amounts

An actuarial investigation is conducted annually for the Defined Benefit category of which Council is a contributing employer. Generally, a full actuarial investigation is conducted every three years and interim actuarial investigations are conducted for each intervening year. An interim investigation was conducted as at 30 June 2024 while a full investigation was conducted as at 30 June 2023.

The Fund's actuarial investigation identified the following for the Defined Benefit category of which Council is a contributing employer:

The VBI surplus means that the market value of the fund's assets supporting the defined benefit obligations exceed the vested benefits that the defined benefit members would have been entitled to if they had all exited on 30 June 2024.

The total service liability surplus means that the current value of the assets in the Fund's Defined Benefit category plus expected future contributions exceeds the value of expected future benefits and expenses as at 30 June 2024.

The discounted accrued benefit surplus means that the current value of the assets in the Fund's Defined Benefit category exceeds the value of benefits payable in the future but accrued in respect of service to 30 June 2024.

The 2025 interim actuarial investigation

An interim actuarial investigation is being conducted for the Fund's position as at 30 June 2025 as the Fund provides lifetime pensions in the Defined Benefit category.

Vision Super has advised that the VBI at 30 June 2025 was 110.5%. Council was notified of the 30 June 2025 VBI during August 2025 (2024: August 2024). The financial assumptions used to calculate this VBI were:

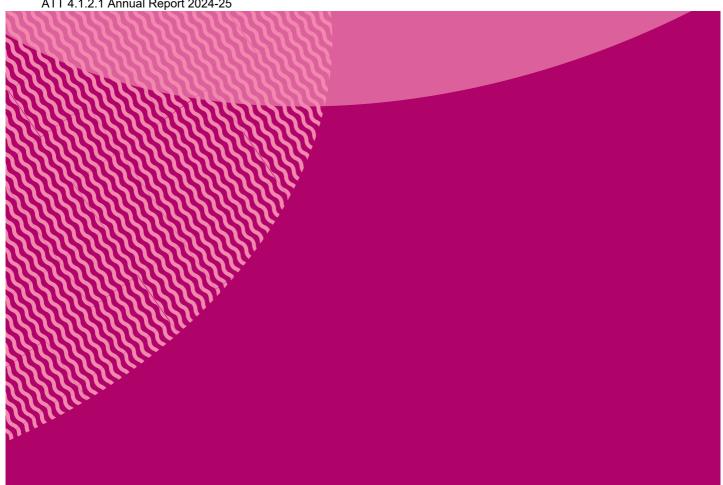

1. Purpose

The purpose of this policy is to outline what strategies and processes are employed at the City of Greater Dandenong (Council) to ensure comprehensive and effective asset management practices are developed and utilised for all assets owned or controlled by Council. This policy is to be read in conjunction with the Asset Management Strategy.

2. Background

The City of Greater Dandenong is responsible for management of physical infrastructure with a replacement value of more than \$2 billion. Council's infrastructure network represents an immense investment, made over many generations and provides the foundation for the social, environmental and economic values of the community. This infrastructure plays an integral part in delivering the services provided by Council and achieving its vision of 'Greater Dandenong is a safe, vibrant city of opportunity for all – to visit, work, live and play.'

The Council Plan also identifies the following objectives which relate to this policy:

- 1. Effective planning and management of Council's infrastructure to ensure it is responsive to contemporary environmental conditions
- 2. Implement the City Improvement Program
- 3. Sound financial management for a sustainable Council.

Stewardship of infrastructure is a core Council function. Millions of dollars are spent annually managing and maintaining infrastructure. It is important that Council employs high-level management skills and practices to ensure that services are delivered economically and sustainably.

Council is developing a best practice asset management framework to enhance Council's asset management practices. This framework extends from this Asset

Management Policy to asset operations and information systems. The framework enables and encourages Council to implement a coordinated approach to the management of all assets under its stewardship.

3. Scope

This policy applies to Council, Executive Management, officers and interested members of the community involved in the acquisition, operations, maintenance, renewal, upgrading and disposal of the City's existing and new assets. It encompasses all asset classes essential for service delivery. They include assets such as Roads, Buildings & Facilities, Stormwater Drainage, Open Space, Plant Fleet and Equipment.

6. Definitions

<u>Asset</u>: A physical component of a facility which has value, enables services to be provided and has an economic life of greater than 12 months.

<u>Asset Management</u>: The systematic and co-ordinated activities and practices of an organisation to optimally and sustainably deliver on its objectives through the cost-effective lifecycle management of assets.

<u>Infrastructure Assets:</u> Stationary systems forming a network and serving whole communities, where the system as a whole is intended to be maintained indefinitely at a particular level of service potential by the continuing replacement and refurbishment of its components. The network may include normally recognised ordinary assets as components.

<u>Lifecycle:</u> The time interval that commences with the identification of the need for an asset and terminates with the decommissioning of the asset or any liabilities thereafter.



7. Council Policy

Vision

As custodians of community assets, the City of Greater Dandenong will provide assets that are accessible, safe, sustainable and responsive to the needs of the community and the contemporary environment.

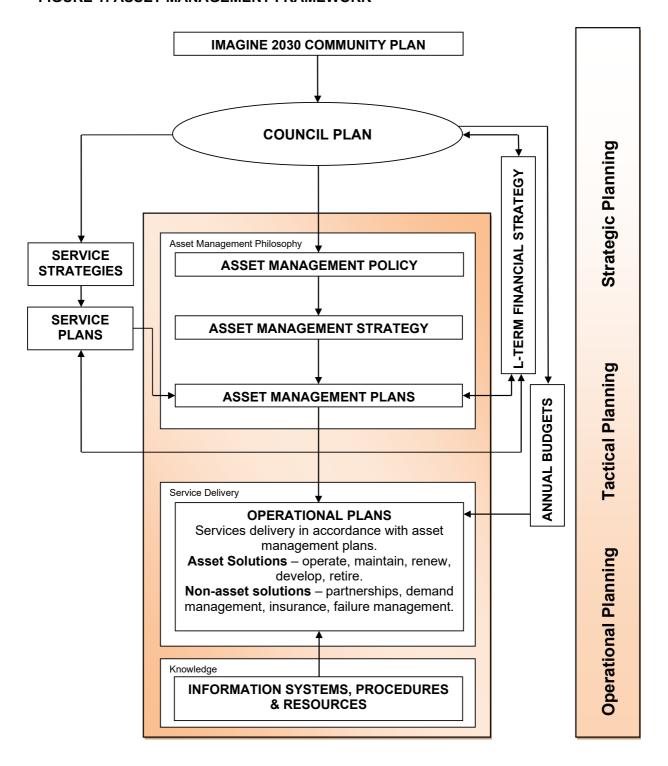
- To achieve Best Appropriate Practice in Asset Management as it applies to the different asset groups.
- To adopt a long term sustainable asset management approach, incorporating life cycle costing into capital investment decisions, including new, expansion or upgrade projects funded by external grants.
- To develop and review Asset Management Plans for each infrastructure asset group, that link to the Long Term Financial Strategy and local government performance and financial reporting frameworks.
- To develop and review service targets and standards in consultation with the community, to ensure long term sustainability of the assets supporting service delivery.
- To give priority to asset renewal or refurbishment when making capital investment decisions thereby ensuring Council's existing assets are properly maintained for ongoing provision of acceptable levels of service.
- To develop effective and affordable preventative maintenance programs aimed at minimising life cycle costs and maximising the service potential of assets.
- To apply appropriate risk management principles and practices for staff, contractors, property and the community.
- To implement and maintain an integrated Asset Management System to ensure a common asset data set is available for strategic, operational and financial reporting purposes.
- To be a progressive Council in Asset Management by incorporating cross collaboration and cultural change.

Policy Implementation

Council's vision and objectives for Asset Management are to be achieved through the continued implementation of Council's Asset Management Framework shown in Figure 1 below.

Responsibilities and Relationships

Council does recognise that asset management requires a 'whole of organisation' approach. Therefore, the appropriate training programs will be initiated in order to increase awareness and build the required capacity for asset management delivery. Capacity building will include presentations for Councillors and training for Council personnel. A session on Asset Management will also be held for Councillors following the start of every Council Election cycle. Council also recognises the importance of establishing well defined roles and responsibilities for its staff and Council regarding asset management. The asset management responsibilities for key stakeholders are summarised below:

Council

- Act as stewards for infrastructure assets and set corporate asset management policy and vision.
- Approve Long Term Financial Plans and provide appropriate resources for asset management activities.
- Endorse Asset Management Plans and monitor their outcomes.

CEO & Executive

- Promote asset management to the organisation, councillors and the community.
- Ensure that asset management policies, strategies and plans are integrated into the corporate governance framework.
- Foster and support a multi-disciplinary Service and Asset Management Steering Group.
- Ensure that accurate and reliable asset information is presented to Council for decision-making.
- Ensure staff are appropriately trained and skilled to perform the required asset management functions.

Service & Asset Management Steering Group (SAS Group)

- Develop the strategic direction for asset management.
- Provide a coordinated, consistent and collaborative approach to asset management and asset management improvement across Council.
- Adopt a cross-functional view and resolve differences between business units when necessary and provide asset management leadership and support to achieve the benefits sought by Council.
- Monitor and review the Asset Management Policy, Asset Management Strategy and individual Asset Management Plans for major asset classes.
- Monitor and evaluate asset management practice and the implementation of the asset management strategy.
- Endorse the long term renewal and upgrade programs for consideration by the CIP Steering Group.
- Report to the Executive Management Team every 6 months and Council every 12 months on asset management performance and improvement actions.

Manager Infrastructure Planning and Asset Planning Staff

- Develop and review Council policy, strategy, objective, guidelines, practices and procedures for Asset Management.
- Oversee development and implementation of asset management plans for all key infrastructure assets, using principles of lifecycle analysis.
- Develop and implement improvement plans for management of infrastructure assets.
- Consult with stakeholders and deliver levels of service to agreed risk and cost standards.
- Manage infrastructure assets in consideration of long term sustainability
- Utilise an integrated Asset Management System appropriately for asset management tasks.
- Review and disseminate asset management information to interested stakeholders
- Raise awareness throughout the organisation of the benefits of sound asset management.
- Communicate Council's commitment to asset management externally through the use of documents such as the Council Plan.

Manager Financial Services

 Prepare financial reports on assets based on accounting standards and financial reporting regulations.

Roles and Responsibilities regarding Asset Classes

This Policy identifies that every Asset Type (e.g. Playgrounds) must have eight (8) accountability roles associated with its management. The roles are: service planning, operations, design, construction/acquisition, maintenance, renewal planning, disposal and asset data management.

Audit and Review

The SAS Group will monitor the relevance of this policy in terms of operational and service needs, along with expectations, corporate goals and targets. Compliance with this policy will also be reviewed on an ongoing basis and the policy shall be amended if it is no longer deemed relevant. A formal review of this policy shall be undertaken as part of the Council Plan process in association with the new Council Terms and will be completed no later than 30 June 2017. There are no financial implications arising from this policy. The policy formalises the framework of asset management practices which have been implemented over the past decade and clarifies the roles and responsibilities.

1. Purpose

To provide clear and consistent processes for considering whether parking fees in Council owned car parking areas should be suspended in relation to particular events, times of year or other special circumstances that may arise from time to time.

2. Background

Prior to Christmas 2002, Council regularly suspended parking fees around that time of year, to encourage more shoppers to visit the Dandenong CAD. The period of time for which fees were suspended varied from three days to two weeks.

In 2002, instead of suspending fees, Council provided a form of subsidy to Dandenong retailers, to assist in implementing a range of activities aimed at encouraging people to visit the area. The subsidy remains in place to the present time.

No suspension of fees occurred for the next three years. In 2005, fees were waived for six weeks commencing mid December. In that year, the initiative was the subject of some criticism from local traders, who were concerned that it had a detrimental impact on their businesses due to reduced access to parking for their customers.

Fees have also been suspended on other occasions in response to specific activities such as construction/re-development activity and special events.

This policy was developed to ensure that a consistent and balanced approach is used to assess whether it is appropriate to suspend parking fees in any particular circumstances, including over the Christmas trading period each year.

3. Scope

This policy will apply to all decisions made by Council and/or the Chief Executive Officer.

5. Definitions

'Parking fee' means:

The fee required to be paid for parking in a given parking area owned by the Greater Dandenong City Council, in accordance with signage displayed in that area.

'Chief Executive Officer'(CEO) means :

The person appointed by Council to be its Chief Executive Officer or any person acting in that position.

6. Council Policy

In October each year the CEO shall request a report from the relevant Council Officers, to determine whether parking fees should be suspended for the Christmas period of that year.

The report will provide information on the following:

- Current parking space occupancy rates;
- · Local economic conditions;
- Trader organisation views;
- · Councillor views;
- Any other relevant matters.

Upon receipt of this report, the Chief Executive Officer or his delegate may authorise the waiving of parking fees for a specified interval during the Christmas trading period each year.

This decision should made no later than 15 November each year, to allow effective advertising of the fee waiver to the community.

At any other time deemed necessary, the Chief Executive Officer may request a report from officers to determine whether parking fees should be suspended in respect of any other particular circumstances that may arise, as outlined in this policy. Any such report will provide the same range of information as set out above.

Upon receipt of this report, the Chief Executive Officer or his delegate may authorise the waiving of parking fees for a specified interval in relation to the subject circumstances. This decision should be made in sufficient time to allow effective advertising of the fee waiver to the community.

1. Purpose

The purpose of this policy is to provide general guidelines for the approval of Loan Guarantees for Community organisations. Its objective is to provide a mechanism to support local communities and sporting organisations to self fund capital asset projects that provide community benefit and that will ultimately vest in or be controlled by Council.

2. Background

This policy was developed to provide a framework for the approval of Loan Guarantees for Community organisations.

3. Scope

This policy will apply to all Council staff and Council. This policy will also apply to Community organisations within the Greater Dandenong City Council municipality.

5. Definitions

Not applicable.



6. Council Policy

As a guiding principal, Council will not undertake to provide Guarantees for loans or other borrowings taken out by Community or other Organisations within Greater Dandenong unless there are exceptional reasons and benefits to the broader Greater Dandenong community in doing so. In all circumstances, Council should only consider provision of a guarantee where Council has and will retain ownership of the Asset.

In considering applications for the City of Greater Dandenong to guarantee community projects, the following issues and factors are to be considered:

Benefits

- Benefit derived by Greater Dandenong citizens from the proposal.
- Capacity for the facility to be used by the broader Greater Dandenong community at times when it is not required for that organisation's purposes.
- Where the proposal satisfies an identified need in the community and the project is consistent with the objectives established in the Council Plan or other strategic planning documents endorsed by Council.

Risks

- Ability of the organisation to meet repayments of any borrowings undertaken, and the likelihood of council having to absorb debt.
- Any impact the proposal may have on Councils budget in respect of revenue streams or operating expenditure such as grants, building maintenance etc.
- Ability of the organisation to manage the proposal to ensure effective completion of project.
- Demonstrated track record of the organization in having a stable administration and governance performance, including the meeting of the requirements of any previous planning permits and compliance with legislative requirements in respect of neighbourhood amenity.

General Considerations

- The nature of work of the organisation and its relation to Council's Community and Council Plan.
- Securities and guarantees from the organisation regarding repayment of such loans to comply with the provisions of the Local Government Act.
- A guarantee should only be considered where the asset to be established resides on Council land and represents a fixed asset that ownership vests with Council.
- Where an asset is to be constructed on Council land, Council should oversee the construction to ensure all Council standards and policies are adhered to.
- Guarantee not to exceed 50% of the value of the asset or project for any one asset or project. The aggregate Council exposure for all Loan Guarantees is not to exceed, at any point in time, one percent (1%) of the annual revenue from Rates income.

- Consideration be given in relation to alternative funding arrangements or schemes available to or sought by the organisation. E.g. Availability of Government grants, creation of a cooperative, commercial sponsorship.
- Consideration must be given to Council's Gaming Policy. As a principle, loan guarantees will not be provided to support the establishment or enhancement of gaming facilities on Council owned land.
- Guarantees will not be provided where works have commenced unless at Council's discretion, where
 extenuating circumstances exist.

The community organisation would be required to demonstrate:

- A benefit to the community by way of ongoing or increased services as a result of acquisition of the
 capital asset. Provision of the capital asset would need to provide community, sporting, recreational,
 cultural or similar benefits that are consistent with the objectives of Council.
- The extent to which broader, multi-purpose access to the facility is provided to other organizations or individuals from Greater Dandenong City Council.
- They satisfy the criteria of a "not for profit" organisation and have an "incorporated" status and have a lease or licence agreement to cover the asset.
- Their capacity to service the loan repayments. This would include presentation to Council of prior year(s) audited financial reports and future cashflow statements that demonstrate financial viability over the period of the loan guarantee. Where the requested guarantee is significant in terms of amount (in excess of \$200,000) Council, at its discretion, may require independent review and assessment of the ability to make loan repayments.
- That the guarantee is not to exceed 50% of the value of the capital asset or project, to be vested in Council, for any one asset or project.
- That the life of the capital asset, to be vested in Council, exceeds the life of the loan guarantee.
- That the organization must settle all outstanding debts to Greater Dandenong City Council prior to Council agreeing to a loan guarantee.

Following Council approval of the loan guarantee, the community organisation would be required to:

- Support any necessary amendments to the loan guarantee documentation to the satisfaction of Council. Council reserves the right to review and amend the loan guarantee documentation in order to minimise exposure from "generic" loan guarantee documents issued by lending institutions.
- Enter into an agreement with Council that should the loan guarantee be called upon by the lending
 institution, that the community group relinquishes all usage right/access to the asset with this
 becoming at the sole discretion of Council. It should be noted that this agreement will supersede any
 previous ground allocations made.
- Provide Council with bi-annual loan statements that demonstrate the status of loan repayments as well as immediately notify Council in the event that any repayments are in default of the loan schedule.
- Provide Council with minutes of the annual general meeting plus annual audited financial statements.

Officer Recommendation

That Council:

- 1. APPROVES the progression of Option 1 for the internal refurbishment of Noble Park Community Centre Building 2 male and female bathrooms to include ambulant toilets and the construction of a new Disability Discrimination Act (DDA) accessible bathroom, subject to procurement outcomes and within the allocated budget;
- 2. APPROVES the progression of the internal refurbishment of Noble Park Community Centre Building 1 foyer kitchenette, subject to procurement outcomes and within the allocated budget; and
- 3. NOTES that funding for these works is proposed to be sourced from the Major Projects Reserve for community infrastructure upgrades.

Executive Summary

- 1. The Noble Park Community Centre comprises two 40+ year old buildings with recent need for accessibility upgrades. Building 1 received a \$28,000 upgrade in 2024 to its accessible bathroom. Building 2 contains a non-compliant accessible bathroom that does not meet the 2022 Building Code of Australia standards. Building 2 users with accessibility needs are required to use the compliant accessible bathroom in Building 1, All Abilities Playground Toilet Block or Ross Reserve Sports Pavilion.
- 2. In response to this, Council initiated a \$50,000 design project in FY 2024/25 to achieve Building 2 bathroom compliance. A July 2024 audit confirmed that the existing Building 2 accessible bathroom cannot be made compliant within its current footprint, necessitating structural changes. The audit also identified the need to add ambulant toilets to the male and female bathrooms.
- 3. Three Building 2 accessible bathroom design options were developed as follows:
 - Option 1: New internal room containing accessible toilet amenities
 - Option 2: Extension to new external room containing accessible toilet amenities
 - Option 3: Extension to prefabricated accessible toilet block pod
- 4. Outside of the above three options, consideration was also given to a low cost 'Portaloo' style arrangement, which is a temporary toilet would need to be located outside the building that is typically used at short term functions and events.
- 5. Given the temporary nature of this style of toilet, potentially without connection to existing services, poor aesthetics, odour management, unknown longevity, as well as the need for users to travel outdoors with exposure to wet weather to access a Portaloo, this option was investigated and carefully considered by Officers but is not able to be recommended due to its shortfalls.



- 6. Following stakeholder consultation, Options 1 and 2 were endorsed, with a preference for Option 2 due to increased space. However, Option 1 was recognised as more cost-effective and lower risk. Option 3 was rejected due to high cost, limited asset lifespan, and reduced quality.
- 7. Concurrently, Noble Park Community Centre management proposed upgrades to Building 1's kitchenette to improve accessibility for disabled users. The proposed works include motorised benchtops and cabinetry to enhance usability for all needs.
- 8. These upgrades will significantly enhance equity and accessibility across the Noble Park Community Centre, aligning with Council's commitment to inclusive and compliant community infrastructure.
- 9. The Noble Park Community Centre currently provide community facilities for the Dandenong Disability Advisory Committee as well as running several of all abilities programs to support arts, gardens, health and wellbeing.
- 10. The estimated costs (including contingency) for the proposed works are:
 - Up to \$450,000 (ex GST) for Building 2-bathroom refurbishments.
 - Up to \$70,000 (ex GST) for Building 1 foyer kitchenette refurbishment.

Background

- 11. The Noble Park Community Centre is a vital Council facility that serves approximately 1,000 patrons weekly and is comprised of Building 1 and Building 2. Building 1 is a larger building constructed in 1976 containing meeting rooms, a basketball court, stage, kitchen, male and female changerooms and bathrooms and a compliant accessible bathroom that received upgrades in 2024 to the value of \$28k.
- 12. Building 2 is a smaller building constructed in 1987 containing a hall, kitchen, male and female bathrooms and a non-compliant accessible bathroom that technically can only cater to ambulant users. Building 2 was compliant with standards at the time of construction but is no longer deemed compliant according to 2022 Building Codes of Australia.
- 13. This non-compliant accessible toilet requires Building 2 patrons with accessibility needs to leave the facility and navigate outdoor conditions to enter Building 1, All Abilities Playground Toilet Block (constructed in 2021) or Ross Reserve Sports Pavilion (constructed in 2023).

- 14. In March 2024, a notice of motion requested that Council acknowledge the need for a compliant accessible bathroom facility within Building 2 of the Noble Park Community Centre and prioritise its installation. Accordingly, a 24/25 accessible bathroom design project was considered by Council and approved to commence with a budget of \$50k.
- 15. An audit conducted by a DDA consultant in July 2024 found the non-compliant Building 2 accessible bathroom to be significantly undersized with no opportunity to achieve compliance within the room's existing footprint. Therefore, any refurbishment solution would require demolition of walls to increase the available space and achieve compliance. The audit also found that the male and female bathrooms do not include ambulant toilets which would need to be remedied if any work is done.
- 16. To support Noble Park Community Centre programming, the use free of charge of the Ross Reserve Sports Pavilion social room containing a compliant accessible bathroom was offered to relocate affected user groups as an alternative to Building 2. Noble Park Community Centre use the Ross Reserve Sports Pavilion social room once a month for committee meetings.
- 17. In September 2024, a meeting was held commencing this design project inviting Noble Park Community Centre staff and relevant stakeholders to discuss the direction of the upcoming process. During this meeting it was agreed by all that the project will produce 3 compliant accessible bathroom concept designs, and one will be selected for detailed refinement based on a cost and benefit analysis.
- 18. The scope was determined to include other non-compliances such as provision of male and female ambulant toilets and widening entry doors for DDA access. An architect was appointed in November 2024 with the design phase and surrounding site investigations occurring until June 2025.
- 19. Concurrent to this Building 2 accessible bathroom design project, Noble Park Community Centre management have been exploring potential improvements to the kitchenette area in Building 1's foyer. While Building 1 boasts a robust commercial kitchen containing two 6-burner stovetop/oven units, two fridges and three sinks, the kitchenette adjacent is a leaner offering for casual patrons. It contains approximately 2.5m of benchtop including overhead and underneath cabinetry, a sink, an instant boiling tap, a microwave and a bar fridge.
- 20. The kitchenette in Building 1 is not arranged to allow wheelchair-using patrons access to its amenities. The under-bench cabinetry is a blockage for wheelchair traffic, and the standard sink fitting is not suitable for accessibility needs without an extended mixer tap. Equally the overhead cabinetry cannot be reached by most disabled users or particularly short patrons.
- 21. A quote was sought to identify a scope including modern motorised benchtop and cabinetry fittings. As well as increasing the size of the kitchenette and revamping the space with new finishes and compliant fixtures, the works will allow wheelchair users access to operate motorised overhead cabinets and adjustable benchtops with use of an up and down controller.

Key Issues and Discussion

22. To produce three compliant accessible bathroom options connecting to Building 2, the architectural design phase employed the use of feature level surveying, services scanning, and geotechnical analysis with consultancy by a structural engineer, a quantity surveyor and a building surveyor.



- 23. The three concepts were developed beyond typical concept designs to provide an accurate comparison of each option's cost exclusive of unknowns such as building permit implications, surrounding non-compliances, authority overlays, etc. It should be noted that all construction options developed will share some portion of work aimed at remedying these surrounding non-compliances.
- 24. The architectural design process has determined three different directions that the refurbishment can take, such as options 1, 2 and 3, with their own costs, benefits and limitations. Please refer attached document for a comparison of concept options.
- 25. In consideration of the costs, benefits and constraints outlined in Table 1.1, the only options that appear cost effective for Council are Option 1 and Option 2 (internal refurbishment valued at \$388,500 or extension valued at \$488,127).
 - Option 1 presents the least risk to Council in terms of unknown factors such as latent conditions causing time and cost variations during construction.
 - Option 2 offers increased trafficable area within Building 2 and locates the bathroom further away from the hall.
 - Option 3 which is valued at \$460,947 is a needlessly expensive endeavour using portable solutions in fixed locations. It is similarly priced to Option 2 with lesser quality finishes and lesser asset lifespan including a typical 5-year warranty on structural elements.
- 26. With the conclusion of the Building 2 accessible bathroom concept design phase in June 2025, a meeting was held inviting Noble Park Community Centre staff and relevant stakeholders to review the findings of the architectural design and quantity surveying consultancies including the perceived benefits and constraints of each concept option as well as a cost indication for construction.
- 27. During this meeting, all attendees agreed that Option 3 was not a viable solution and that an event-style portable bathroom unit in any other location such as the carpark in front of the building would not achieve the equity that is intended as an outcome of this project. Noble Park Community Centre staff supported options 1 and 2 conceptually, indicating a particular preference for Option 2 but understanding that Option 1 may be a more achievable cost within Council's budget.
- 28. During this discussion Noble Park Community Centre management also presented their intent to upgrade the kitchenette in Building 1. The Building 1 works, which are aimed at enabling DDA access to the kitchenette amenities.
- 29. These facilities will provide for the Dandenong Disability Advisory Committee as well as running a number of all abilities programs to support arts, gardens, health and wellbeing.
- 30. In early September 2025, the Noble Park Community Centre Committee of Management met for their regular monthly committee meeting. The Council officer recommendation to undertake 'Option 1' Building 2 internal refurbishment including a new compliant accessible bathroom was discussed as an agenda item and supported.
- 31. Based on the findings of the concept design phase, quantity surveying and discussions with the Noble Park Community Centre staff, it is recommended to undertake an internal refurbishment of Building 2's male and female bathrooms to include ambulant toilets and construction of a new DDA accessible bathroom (Option 1) for \$450,000 ex GST (including contingency). It is also recommended to undertake an internal refurbishment of Building 1's foyer kitchenette for \$70,000 ex GST (including contingency).

 - Up to \$70,000 (ex GST) for Building 1 foyer kitchenette refurbishment (including contingency).

Officer Recommendation

That Council:

- 1. NOTES all community members and local business owners who objected to the sale of 275 Lonsdale Street, Dandenong were invited to present their submissions to Council at the Pre-Council Meeting on 13 October 2025. One community member/business owner, has indicated their intent to attend on the 13 October 2025 Pre-Council Meeting to present their objection. At the time of writing this report, officers have not received any further acceptances to attend the abovementioned Council Meeting;
- 2. ACKNOWLEDGES that the property at 275 Lonsdale Street, Dandenong is surplus to Council's requirements; and
- 3. AUTHORISES the sale of 275 Lonsdale Street, Dandenong (the Land) by a public process and the Chief Executive Officer to execute all documentation associated with the sale of the Land, ensuring the property will not be sold for less than the market value of the Land.

Executive Summary

- 1. A four-week community engagement process was conducted regarding the proposed sale of Land.
- 2. Council received a total of six submissions from the community, comprising:
 - Two (2) responses in support of the proposal
 - Three (3) responses objecting to the proposal
 - One (1) petition

Please refer to the Attachment for the three (3) written objections and petition.

Background

- 3. The Land was fire damaged in 2017.
- 4. Council purchased the Land in 2019 with the strategic intent to demolish the damaged building and integrate it with Vanity Lane.
- 5. The goal was to enhance pedestrian connectivity between the station, market, and Thomas Street multi-deck car park.
- 6. On 8 July 2024, Council resolved to discontinue the project, reallocating remaining funds to the DNA Gallery.



- 7. On 23 June 2025 Council endorsed that the CEO commence the process to sale of the Land by way of public notices and community engagement proposing the Land is no longer required.
- 8. In July 2025, a public notice and community engagement process was undertaken in accordance with the Local Government Act 2020.
- 9. Six (6) responses were received from community members and business owners, two (2) in support of the proposal, three (3) objections to the proposal and one (1) petition.
- 10. All who objected to the sale were invited to present their submissions at the Pre-Council Meeting scheduled for Monday, 13 October 2025.

Key Issues and Discussion

- 11. The objections and petition were from a variety of community and business owners, with concerns grouped into four main themes:
 - Preservation of Strategic Opportunity Concerns about losing a site with long-term value to the community.
 - Community Expectations and Trust Concerns about transparency and alignment with public interest.
 - Economic Impact on Local Businesses Potential negative effects on nearby businesses.
 - Business Owner's Perspective –Negative impact the sale is going to have on the businesses operating in the area. Disappointment in the original project not going ahead.

Re: Request to reconsider City of Greater Dandenong sale of 275 Lonsdale Street, Dandenong

I understand from reading council's website that this property was acquired to support the Vanity Lane project, which has now ceased.

I also understand from reading council's website that any surplus funds will go towards supporting the Dandenong New Art gallery.

I believe that an open market sale of the property is a mistake, and council should.

Instead – retain ownership of the property and partner with the market or sell it to a not-for-profit housing provider and develop a mixed-use building with a mixture of retail, office and affordable/social housing.

The land is zoned within the CDZ2, right in the heart of the Dandenong MAC. It is likely that any future purchaser will essentially do the same, except for private housing.

At least if council facilitates the project, it can retain some degree of control as to design quality and perhaps set a good example for design direction within the Dandenong (and ergo, the City of Greater Dandenong) with a good community benefit.

Multiple council's have done the same in the past years. Have a look at:

- Darebin City Council 52-60 Townhall Avenue, Preston (Preston MAC) this was a council carpark, but council sold the air rights to a non-for-profit housing provider who then developed social housing above.
- Merri-bek City Council 2 Wilkinson Street, Brunswick (Brunswick MAC) again this
 was a council car park, but council retained ownership of it and divested
 responsibility of this property to a non-for-profit housing provider.

Furthermore, if the council is worried about town planning processes delaying approvals to facilitate redevelopment, they should consider engaging the Department of Transport and Planning's Development Facilitation Program.

I am personally aware that a majority sitting councillors fundamentally are opposed to the notion of social housing because of the stigma that is associated with social housing residents, but at the end of the day – housing is right, no matter how diverse humanity is.

In summary, I believe that an open market sale of the property should be reconsidered or at least truncated to either be delivered in partnership with the private market or sold to a non-for-profit housing provider to deliver a high quality mixed use project.

- 2. The Instrument comes into force immediately the common seal of Council is affixed to the Instrument; and
- 3. The duties and functions set out in the Instrument must be performed, and the powers set out in the instruments must be executed, in accordance with any guidelines or policies of Council that it may from time to time adopt.



Executive Summary

- In accordance with section 11(7) of the Local Government Act 2020, provided as Attachment 1, Council is required to review and update its Instruments of Delegation within 12 months of a general election.
- 2. The last review of Council's S6 Instrument of Delegation made directly to staff was conducted in August 2022.
- 3. This report presents:
 - An updated S6 Instrument of Delegation by Council to Members of Council Staff, reflecting changes to legislation, conditions and limitations, and delegate titles since August 2022.
 - A new S18 Instrument of Sub-Delegation, required under the *Environment Protection Act* 2017, to enable Council officers to perform statutory duties under this legislation.

Background

- 4. Council, as a statutory body, is responsible for carrying out various powers, duties and functions under a range of State legislation and Council's Local Laws under the *Local Government Act 2020*.
- 5. Council and the Chief Executive Officer (CEO) may delegate many powers, duties and functions to Council officers, particularly those of an administrative or operational nature, those that require officers with certain qualifications to undertake them and those that generally do not require formal Council consideration. Delegation is an important tool which allows for the efficient and effective function of the organisation.
- 6. The S6 Instrument of Delegation by Council to members of Council Staff (Attachment 2), provided by Maddocks Law Firm, includes all recent legislative updates and conditions/limitations specifically for Greater Dandenong City Council.
- 7. The S18 Instrument of Sub-Delegation (**Attachment 3**) is essential for Council to meet its obligations under the *Environment Protection Act 2017*, particularly in relation to environmental health and protection. It enables authorised officers to perform functions related to environmental compliance and enforcement. This is a new delegation required due to an update in the legislation.
- 8. Whilst the Local Government Act 2020 only allows Council to delegate to the CEO or delegated committees, other Acts do contain provisions that allow Council to directly delegate powers, duties and functions to staff.
- 9. These Acts often include clauses that explicitly empower Council to delegate to staff, and in some cases, do not permit sub-delegation, making direct delegation necessary.
- 10. To support this approach, Maddocks Law Firm provide regular updates to Victorian Councils, including Greater Dandenong, on delegation formats and maintains that direct delegation is appropriate under these other legislative frameworks.

- b. Planning and Environment (Fees) Regulations 2016
- c. Road Management (General) Regulations 2016
- d. Road Management (Works and Infrastructure) Regulations 2015
- e. Residential Tenancies (Caravan Parks and Movable Dwellings Registration and Standards) Regulations 2024

Key Issues and Discussion

- 13. Delegations are where a member of Council staff is empowered to act on Council's behalf. The decision of the delegate is deemed to be a decision of Council. Powers, duties and functions are delegated to a Council position.
- 14. The S6 Instrument of Delegation by Council to Members of Council Staff is a key administrative tool that delegates powers from Council-to-Council staff to ensures staff can continue to act on Council's behalf in accordance with updated legislative requirements.
- 15. The document has been reviewed by internal staff and the Executive Leadership Team. Minor updates have been made to formatting and position titles to reflect current organisational structure.
- 16. The S18 Instrument of Sub-Delegation under the Environment Protection Act 2017 is a new Instrument to Greater Dandenong City Council. The Environment Protection Authority (EPA) allows councils to appoint officers under the Environmental Protection Act 2017. These officers can then be provided with specific EPA powers.
- 17. The Environment Protection Act 2017 supports the EPA and other authorities in reducing pollution and managing waste. Recent legislative changes have enabled the EPA to delegate specific powers to local councils. As a result, it is now necessary for Council to formally delegate these functions to relevant staff to ensure they are exercised appropriately and in accordance with legislative requirements.
- 18. Both instruments have been reviewed in consultation with Maddocks Law Firm to ensure legal accuracy and operational relevance.

Attachment 1 - Section 11 of the Local Government Act 2020

- (1) A Council may by instrument of delegation delegate to:
 - (a) the members of a delegated committee; or
 - (b) the Chief Executive Officer:
 - (c) any power, duty or function of a Council under this Act or any other Act other than a power, duty or function specified in subsection (2).
- (2) The following are specified for the purposes of subsection (1) (these things cannot be delegated to the CEO):
 - (a) the power of delegation (to the CEO);
 - (b) the power to elect a Mayor or Deputy Mayor;
 - (c) the power to grant a reasonable request for leave under section 35;
 - (d) subject to subsection (3), the power to appoint the Chief Executive Officer, whether on a permanent or acting basis;
 - the power to make any decision in relation to the employment, dismissal or removal of the Chief Executive Officer;
 - (f) the power to approve or amend the Council Plan;
 - (g) the power to adopt or amend any policy that the Council is required to adopt under this Act;
 - (h) the power to adopt or amend the Governance Rules;
 - (i) the power to appoint the chair or the members to a delegated committee;
 - (j) the power to make, amend or revoke a local law;
 - (k) the power to approve the budget or revised budget;
 - (I) the power to borrow money;
 - (m) subject to section 181H(1)(b) of the Local Government Act 1989, the power to declare general rates, municipal charges, service rates and charges and special rates and charges;
 - any power, duty or function prescribed by the regulations for the purposes of this subsection.
- (3) A Council may delegate to the Chief Executive Officer the power to appoint an Acting Chief Executive Officer for a period not exceeding 28 days.
- (4) A delegation may be made subject to any conditions or limitations specified in the instrument of delegation.
- (5) A delegation that includes the power to enter into a contract or make any expenditure must specify a maximum monetary limit that cannot be exceeded.
- (6) A member of a delegated committee to whom a delegation is given under subsection (1)(a) can only exercise the delegation while acting as a member of the delegated committee at a meeting of the delegated committee.

- (7) A Council must review, within the period of 12 months after a general election, all delegations which have been made under this section and are still in force.
- (8) A Council must keep a public register of delegations made under this section.
- (9) Unless sooner revoked, a delegation made by a Council under the *Local Government Act 1989* continues in force until 1 September 2020.

Instrument of Delegation

 - 2.3. the delegate must not determine the issue, take the action or do the act or thing:
 - 2.3.1. if the issue, action, act or thing is an issue, action or thing which Council has previously designated as an issue, action, act or thing which must be the subject of a Resolution of Council;
 - 2.3.2. if the determining of the issue, taking of the action or doing of the act or thing would or would be likely to involve a decision which is inconsistent with a
 - (a) policy; or
 - (b) strategy
 - adopted by Council;
 - 2.3.3. if the determining of the issue, the taking of the action or the doing of the act or thing cannot be the subject of a lawful delegation; or
 - 2.3.4. the determining of the issue, the taking of the action or the doing of the act or thing is already the subject of an exclusive delegation to another member of Council staff or delegated committee.

S18 INSTRUMENT OF SUB-DELEGATION UNDER THE ENVIRONMENT PROTECTION ACT 2017

20 OCTOBER 2025

Preamble

Instrument of Sub-Delegation

By this Instrument of Sub-Delegation, in exercise of the power conferred by s 437(2) of the Environment Protection Act 2017 ('Act') and the Instrument of Delegation of the Environment Protection Authority under the Act dated 4 June 2021, the Council:

- 1. delegates each duty and/or function and/or power described in column 1 of the Schedule (and summarised in column 2 of the Schedule) to the member of Council staff holding, acting in or performing the duties of the office or position described in column 3 of the Schedule;
- 2. this Instrument of Sub-Delegation is authorised by a resolution of Council passed on 13 October 2025 pursuant to a power of sub-delegation conferred by the Instrument of Delegation of the Environment Protection Authority under the Act dated 4 June 2021;
- 3. the delegation:
 - 3.1 comes into force immediately once the common seal of Council is affixed to this Instrument of Sub-Delegation;
 - 3.2 remains in force until varied or revoked;
 - 3.3 is subject to any conditions and limitations set out in sub-paragraph 5, and the Schedule; and
 - 3.4 must be exercised in accordance with any guidelines or policies which Council from time to time adopts; and
- 4. this Instrument of Sub-Delegation is subject to the following limitations:
 - 4.1 the powers, duties and functions described in column and summarised in column 2 of the Schedule are only delegated for the purpose of regulating:
 - 4.1.1 onsite wastewater management systems with a design or actual flow rate of sewage not exceeding 5000 litres on any day; and
 - 4.1.2 noise from the construction, demolition or removal of residential premises;
- 5. the delegate must not determine the issue, take the action or do the act or thing:
 - 5.1 if the issue, action, act or thing is an issue, action or thing which Council has previously designated as an issue, action, act or thing which must be the subject of a Resolution of Council;
 - 5.2 if the determining of the issue, taking of the action or doing of the act or thing would or would be likely to involve a decision which is inconsistent with a
 - a. policy; or
 - b. strategy
 - adopted by Council;
- 5.3 if the determining of the issue, the taking of the action or the doing of the act or thing cannot be the subject of a lawful delegation; or
- 5.4 the determining of the issue, the taking of the action or the doing of the act or thing is already the subject of an exclusive delegation to another member of Council staff.

Monash with 509 licences, City of Casey with 366 licences, City of Kingston with 495 licences and Frankston City Council with 268 licences.

The Committee raised several key points during the discussion on alcohol and drug-related harm in Greater Dandenong:

- Despite having fewer liquor licences than neighbouring councils, Greater Dandenong experiences significant harm due to the concentration of alcohol outlets, highlighting the need for targeted local strategies.
- The importance of considering not just the number of licences, but also the impact and accessibility of alcohol when developing harm minimisation approaches.
- Strong support for community-led, place-based prevention strategies tailored to the specific needs of Greater Dandenong.
- Strategies must reflect the cultural diversity of the municipality, incorporate the perspectives and lived experiences of different communities to ensure programs are inclusive, culturally appropriate, and accessible.
- The need to strengthen community awareness of available support programs and harm minimisation initiatives, using tailored communication approaches that resonate with diverse groups across the municipality.

Discussion and Comments:

- Council no longer assesses alcohol management plans for new licenses; this is now handled by Victorian Liquor Commission.
- There was a suggestion to analyse per capita alcohol harm among drinkers rather than the general population.
- Suggestions for mapping hotspots and improving data transparency.
- Committee members mentioned that cultural norms and fear of visa cancellation contribute to non-reporting among migrant communities.
- Some individuals may not recognize behaviours as family violence due to upbringing in patriarchal societies.
- There was interest in accessing triple-zero call data for specific precincts to better understand incident volumes.

Responsibilities of Chairperson & Chair Nominations

Members were invited to express interest if they wish to nominate for the Chairperson role in future terms. This allows for leadership opportunities for other members who may wish to step into the role.

Kylie Reid (Chisholm Institute – Foundation College) was re-nominated by the committee and accepted the role of Chair for the next 12 months (30 June 2025). The committee acknowledged her previous contributions.

- SSI has received a small emergency relief grant for individuals experiencing financial hardship, and is also launching a national disability employment program, with recruitment underway in Victoria, Sydney, and Queensland.

SECL update on Bring Your Bills Day event.

- Upcoming event in Hampton Park on 2 September.
- Previous event in Pakenham attracted over 400 attendees, many from Greater Dandenong.
- Focus on financial hardship, legal rights, and access to concessions and grants.
- Over 26,000 fines addressed through partnerships with legal and financial services.
- Emphasis on language barriers and lack of awareness of legal rights.
- Services include energy companies, banks, ombudsman representatives, and legal aid.

Sisterworks shared **Springvale and Dandenong Employment Programs**:

- High demand for training and placement programs, particularly among newly arrived women.
- Local manufacturing partnerships have created employment opportunities.
- Community members are actively seeking work, often through word-of-mouth.

Wares from their shops are exhibited alongside an album that narrates their journey to Australia, and products that remind them of home. This has been popular with more people visiting their stalls.
- HOME 25 has also been very popular on social media with an increased reach of 590% and 1000% more link clicks in its first month
- An external cultural organisation expressed interest in exploring future partnership opportunities related to HOME

Upcoming programs

- Arts in Greater Dandenong Season Two Brochure exhibits all programs of arts, theatre, workshops, and community events available.
- HOME 25 Public Programs:
 - Reworlding Dandenong is an immerse adventure through a futuristic vision of Dandenong in 2050. The experience led by Troy Innocent and RMIT's Future Play Lab engages participants to explore reimagined cityscapes
 - Reworlding might be included in future programs with other Council teams.

5 NOTICES OF MOTION

A Notice of Motion is a notice setting out the text of a motion proposed to be moved at the next relevant meeting. It must be in writing, signed by a Councillor, and be lodged with the Chief Executive Officer in sufficient time for them to give each Councillor at least 72-hours notice of such notice.

The guidelines for submitting a notice of motion to a Council meeting are included in the current Governance Rules.



6 REPORTS FROM COUNCILLORS/DELEGATED MEMBERS AND COUNCILLORS' QUESTIONS

The principal purpose of this item in the Council Meeting Agenda is for Councillors to report on their attendance, observations or important matters arising from their liaison or representation with groups for which the Councillor has been formally appointed by Council. In accordance with the documented 'protocol' that applies to either liaisons or representatives, Councillors should raise matters of importance during this item. Other matters may also be reported.

If a Councillor chooses to speak, the name of the conference/event and the Councillor will be noted in the Minutes for that meeting. If a Councillor requires additional information on the conference/event to be listed in the Minutes, they must submit it in writing to a Governance staff member by 12.00pm the day following this Council Meeting.

Question time is provided to enable Councillors to address questions to members of Council staff. The guidelines for asking questions at a Council meeting are included in the current Governance Rules.

Councillors have a total of 15 minutes each to report on their attendances at meetings, conferences or events and to ask questions of Council staff.



7 URGENT BUSINESS

No business may be admitted as urgent business unless it:

- a) relates to or arises out of a matter which has arisen since distribution of the Agenda; and
- b) cannot safely or conveniently be deferred until the next ordinary meeting and unless agreed to by a majority of those Councillors present at the meeting.
